'Sounds of Today' will entertain at county fair

Clackamas County fairgoers this year will have an opportunity to hear a local vocal and instrumental group that has already won national recognition. "Sounds of Today", an aggregation of eight singers and four instrumentalists from Clackamas County Community College, will present an hour's show on the outdoor stage at the Canby fairgrounds every day 4 to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday, Aug. 14-18, it is announced by Audri Cotton,

program director for the fair. The singing group, directed by Judy Hylton, a music teacher at the college, is one of 15 groups selected from throughout the United States to make an eight-week, all-expense-paid USO tour of the Orient next fall. They will leave the United States on Nov. 15.

The community college singers and instrumentalists, as their name implies, specialize in "now" sounds. Mrs. Cotton points out. In addition to their "total" sound, she adds, performances will include solos, duets, trios, and quartets. Music billed for the afternoon fair shows includes rock, folk, sound track material from movies, country and blues.

The "Sounds of Today" group has been enthusiastically received by audiences throughout the region in recent months, the fair program director says. "We are happy to provide the opportunity for all county residents to hear them at this year's fair", she adds.

In addition to the "Sounds of Today" performance every day at four, there will be continuous outdoor stage shows on the hour every hour from noon till late evening throughout the five-day fair, Mrs. Cotton says. Outstanding talent from all parts of the region has been booked for this year's Clackamas County "Country Fair", she observes, noting that many talented youngsters who have performed on the fair's outdoor stage in previous years are now making names for themselves in the entertainment world.

Traffic convictions increase

Oregon courts convicted more than 206,000 people of violating traffic laws during the first six months of this year. The figure is 17 per cent higher than for the same period last year.

In a report covering the first half of the year, the Motor Vehicles Division suspended 27,069 driver licenses, all but 4,273 of them under mandatory provisions of the law. Total suspensions issued for all causes increased more than 12 per cent over the first half of 1972, but suspensions for driving while under the influence of liquor increased more than 24 per cent. The report shows 6,610 licenses suspended as a result of court convictions on this charge.

The report also showed that the number of people refusing to submit to breath test so far this year increased 54 per cent—from 837 for the first half of 1972 to 1,291 through June of this year. The agency's driver improvement and control program showed increases in all areas of activity. Nearly 12,000 advisory letters were sent to drivers with too-frequent entries of convictions or accidents on their records. More than 3,600 drivers were called-in for interviews to discuss their driving records and 1,300 licenses were suspended when drivers failed to improve their records after all other steps had been exhausted.

Hatfield seeks protection for wilderness

Congress must act to protect existing wilderness areas from exploitation and destruction by mining, Senator Mark Hatfield said at a Senate Interior Committee hearing in Washington, D.C. Wednesday. The committee is considering legislation to ban the filing of all mining claims in wilderness areas, permitted until 1984 under the Wilderness Act.

"Rock Mesa in the Three Sisters Wilderness is in danger of being pillaged legally through the use of this loophole," Hatfield said.

"The economic value of pumice cannot offset the environmental havoc such mining would create," he said.

Hatfield noted that passage of the legislation (S. 1010) would not solve the Rock Mesa problem because it would apply prospectively, not retrospectively.

He said the Rock Mesa claims of the U.S. Pumice Company are under administrative review by the U.S. Forest Service.

He pointed out that the Oregon Congressional delegation is united in its opposition to mining in this area.

Hatfield told the Senate committee that pictures of mining in California resemble a barren, desolate moonscape.
