Sandy man win court reversal

A Sandy man, Mark Alter, 30, won reversal of a contempt conviction last week in San Francisco.

The reversal came from the U.S. Court of Appeals over refusal to answer questions in a federal probe of the Weatherman radicals.

Alter twice refused to answer questions before a federal grand jury investigation of the Weatherman group. He took the fifth Amendment on his first refusal last Nov. 13 and refused again Jan. 16 after being granted immunity from prosecution.

U.S. Dist. Judge Spencer Williams ordered Alter jailed for contempt Jan. 18. The appeals court ordered him released Feb. 22 pending the outcome of his appeal.

In vacating Judge Williams' order, the appeals court said that when complex problems are raised, a standard of five days should be provided to allow the defendant to counter the charges.

The appeals court remanded the matter to Judge Williams for future government action in line with the ruling.

Since a funeral is essentially a religious service and since funeral services are held because they bring consolation to those who are left behind, you might consider leaving the choice of what shall be done entirely up to your children. There are many clergymen in the Gresham area who understand your attitude and can be very helpful to your survivors when the time comes.

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
