

County moves to stop development

Clackamas County filed an order last week to stop development in the Eagle Creek area. The two couples had sought to place multi-family units on property located at Eagle Creek and the Natural Rivers.

The measure was passed by county voters last November and states in one section that no condominiums, apartments, trailer parks or mobile home parks shall be constructed or placed within an approximately 25-mile stretch along the Clackamas River from Carver to Estacada.

Risberg had argued that because the multi-family units had been placed on the property before the passage of the measure, that they should be allowed to continue the development.

According to Dist. Atty. Robert Burns, the Risbergs continued to move additional units onto the property while the request was pending before the commissioners.

County gets highway-user funding

The Oregon Transportation Commission today announced distribution of \$6,824,188.65 in highway-user tax funds to the 36 counties of the state.

The allocation is based on the statutory 20 per cent for the period April 1 through June 30, 1973. The funds come from the following sources: motor vehicle registration and operators' license fees, gasoline tax, use fuel tax, motor carrier fees, and fines and penalties collected for violations of the size and weight statutes where complaints are made by the Highway Division weighmasters.

The allocation to each county is based on the number of vehicles registered in it. The

allocation for Clackamas County is \$547,021.20.

Forest area restrictions imposed

Effective last Thursday, July 19, the State Forester invoked a "Regulated Closure" on certain forest lands in the Clackamas-Marion Forest Protection district.

This closure makes it unlawful to smoke while working or traveling through this area, except while inside an enclosed vehicle that is equipped with an ashtray. Also this closure prohibits all campfires, except at certain well established and safe campgrounds. This will limit fires to maintained parks.

This closure is deemed necessary because of the very dry spring and early summer and the recent hot weather that is causing rapid drying of the forest fuels. Although this closure does not stop the use of

the forest areas, District Forester Chan Bunke asks the general public to stay out of the high hazard areas, that is, areas of logging slash, forest thinning, scorchification, etc.

Another caution extended by Bunke is directed to operators of vehicles in the forested areas. The law states that all internal combustion engines must be equipped with an adequate muffler, while operated on public roads. And they must be equipped with approved spark arresters while being operated off public roads.

This law is particularly aimed at the use of motorcycles in the forested areas during the closed fire season.

Bunke also wants to caution landowners and residents as to the liability they incur through

the use of fire for any purpose. Basically, the Oregon Forest Laws state that anyone who uses fire for any purpose must first secure a permit and abide by its terms. And secondly, this fire user becomes liable for the costs of controlling and extinguishing any fire that escapes the intended burning area. Bunke feels that all people would be much more careful in the use of fire if they were aware of their liability and the costs and penalties they are subject to.

As the fire season progresses and gets more dangerous, it will be necessary for everyone to be more careful than they were yesterday if we are to avoid a serious fire situation.
