

Historic fabrics on display at Clackamas County fair

Historic fabrics from America's past will weave a tapestry of the old-time country tradition to enhance this year's Atrium Gallery Art Fair, Aug. 14-18, it is announced by Marian Munger, Linn, director of the fair exhibit.

Among the antique items,

historic objects and fabrics to be featured is a striking hanging hand-crafted by Mrs. Munger's great-grandmother from wool she sheared, carded, and wove over a century ago. Included also will be fabrics by Greeff from the American Heritage Collection, royalties from the sale of many of these pieces having been used recently to finance the work of the National Federation for the Preservation of Endangered (Wildlife) Species. Fabrics in this collection depict a broad range of American bird and animal species and flora. Other hangings at the exhibit, all from private collections, will include antique hangings from India and other parts of the world, modern fabrics, and some form the Portiere era.

This fabric collage motif show, Mrs. Munger says, is really an exhibition around an exhibit. "The fascinating fabrics on display," she observes, "will not only serve a decorative purpose, but each has an eloquent story to tell."

The main thrust of the Atrium

Gallery exhibit at the county fair, she says, will be the same as it has been for almost a decade—the exhibition of creative works by outstanding Oregon artists. The fabric show is merely a backdrop to accentuate the art display which, year after year, has attracted the participation of a growing number of artists.

This year, Mrs. Munger says, the Clackamas County Fair art exhibit, sponsored jointly by the Clackamas County Fair Board and the Lake Oswego Art Guild, promises to be the biggest on record. Between 150 and 200 artists from all parts of Oregon and from southwestern Washington are expected to participate.

Classifications in the senior division of the exhibit are broken down into "Modern" and "Traditional" with \$20, \$15, and \$10 first, second, and third place awards going to winners in each of three media in both classifications. (oil, acrylics, or mixed; watercolors; other media: drawings, prints, etc.)

A "Best of Show" award of \$50 will again be presented to the senior division over-all winner by the Lake Oswego Art Guild.

The Junior Division, open to all junior high and high school students invites works in two classifications: oils or other media; and watercolors or drawings. Awards of \$10, \$5, and \$2.50 will go to winners in each classification. In addition, the Lake Oswego Art Guild will give \$25 as a "Best of Junior Show Award."

Entry fee in the Senior Division, Mrs. Munger says, is \$1.50 for 1 to 3 entries, with a maximum of nine works. Junior Division entry fee is \$1 for two works. All works, she emphasizes, must be ready to hang with the artist's name, address, and telephone number attached to the back of each.

Entries may be shipped postpaid after July 31 to the Pavilion Bldg., Clackamas County Fairgrounds, Canby, Oregon 97013. Works delivered in person will be received at the fairgrounds office Saturday, Aug. 11, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Entries close to 4 p.m. Saturday, August 11, with judging scheduled for Sunday, Aug. 12.

New traffic law restricts trailer towing

If you drive a camper, tow a trailer or operate any vehicle with a gross weight of 6,000 pounds or more, there's a new traffic law now in effect restricting your use of some traffic lanes on divided highways.

Here's what the law says: On a divided road where there are three or more lanes for traffic moving in the same direction, these vehicles can be driven in the extreme left-hand lane only when necessary to enter or leave the road, in response to an emergency condition or when otherwise indicated by appropriate signs or signals.

Otherwise, these units must use either the extreme right-hand lane or the center lane of a three lane highway.

When there are two lanes for traffic moving in the same direction, campers, vehicles with trailers and those weighing 6,000 or more are to be driven in the right-hand lane. They cannot move into the left-hand lane until the lane change can be made "without interfering with the passage of other vehicles."

The restrictions on lane use for these units carried an emergency clause and took effect on passage.
