Bank debits for the 23 reporting banks including Clackamas counties were up in 1973, compared to July 1972, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business and Economic Research has found.

For July 1973, totaling \$1,000,000, the total was \$260,397,000 and for July 1972, the total was \$250,000,000.

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Cottrell to double shift 4th, 5th grade students

Cottrell School will be in session a half-day for all students (including 4th graders) Tuesday, Sept. 4. The buses will run regular routes at the same morning times as last year and all students will be dismissed at 12 noon Tuesday.

A meeting of interested parents and the Cottrell School Board was held at the school

Tuesday night, Aug. 28, at 8 p.m. regarding any and all possible alternatives for the large 4th grade (42) and 5th grade (33). The meeting was a requested follow-up of a determination made by the board at their regular meeting held Tuesday, Aug. 21, at which time a decision was made to double-shift both the 4th and 5th grades.

After hearing all interested parents' views and possible alternatives, the board voted to inaugurate a 5-hour split-shift program for the 4th grade to start Wednesday, Sept. 5. The first group of 4th graders will start their day in the classroom at 7:30 a.m. Wednesday, Sept. 5.

This group will include the students living below the hill on Herrick Road, up Radford Hill to Bluff Road, up Bluff Road to Pomazi's, back down Hauglum Road to Reynolds Road and down Reynolds Road to school.

All 4th grade parents will be individually notified as to the time their youngsters will be picked up by bus.

The first 4th grade class will be dismissed at 12:30 p.m. The afternoon class will be from 12 noon to 5 p.m. This group will be the students living west on Bluff Road to Cottrell Road, down Bluff to Belcher's Nursery, back up Bluff to Booth Road, down Booth Road to Dunn Road, around the loop to Brooks Road, back up Booth to Hauglum, down Hauglum to

Reynolds and back to school.

All students living in Reynolds Mobile court will come to the afternoon session.

A lunch snack will be served to both groups at a cost of 15c to each student, but both 4th grade groups will eat lunch at home. Any parent having questions about this newly adopted temporary double-shifting plan for the 4th grade are urged to call the school for information.

The board's decision by vote at the Tuesday night meeting was to have a team-teaching program (2 certified teachers for a regular school day) for the 5th grade. There is a possibility that the 5th grade may have to convert to a double-shifting plan; there is a significant increase in the 5th grade enrollment as the year progresses.

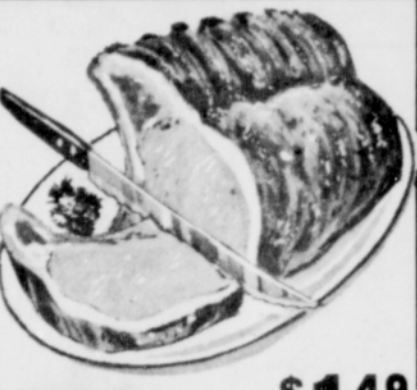
