

School enrollment expected to drop

Oregon public school enrollment, which has flirted with the half-million mark in recent years, won't reach it in 1973-74, State Superintendent Dale Parnell predicted.

In fact, Parnell estimated 496,000 students would enroll in kindergarten through grade 12, a 2,000 drop from last year.

Oregon's record enrollment of 498,686 came in 1971-72. The number was expected to hold steady, if not drop slightly until 1976-77 when it would begin climbing again. But a new factor has entered the picture: state support for kindergartens.

"Predicting enrollment this year is especially tough," Parnell said, "because we can't pin down the number of kindergarten children to expect." In increasing state support for schools, the 1973 Legislature plugged kindergartens into the basic school support formula.

"This good news came too late for most districts to prepare for this school year," Parnell said, adding that it will take a year for local districts without kindergarten programs to make preparations.

Last year some 1,000 children were enrolled in public kindergartens. About 12,000 are expected this year.

Temporary overhead power lines had to be installed over the weekend to resume power to the college while the break in the underground cable is being inspected.

Q. What are the principal things I should look for when I purchase cemetery property?

A. If you are buying grave spaces in a cemetery which is owned or controlled by a religious group or by a city or county agency, you are protected by their perpetual existence. If you are acquiring property in any other type of cemetery you should exercise extreme caution. A family cemetery plot is the most enduring purchase you will ever make. You have the right to know:

1. Who owns the cemetery and what provisions have been made for its continuity?
2. How much money is in the endowment fund; where the fund is deposited; who controls it; and what happens to it if the cemetery becomes defunct?
3. What long range provisions exist for the maintenance, future development, and needs of the cemetery?
4. How much money does the cemetery owe: who holds the mortgage; what happens to you if the cemetery defaults?
