How About a Community Survey?

The city of Sandy has made some major strides in preparing for the future of the city during the past year.

First, the city hired its first city administrator Carl Hatfield, Jr. He came on the scene in February and since that time those attending city council meetings have noticed a "more business-like atmosphere."

One of his first jobs has been to update and develop for the city ordinances needed to properly run the city government.

Second, the city planners have been working on a comprehensive plan for Sandy and the surrounding area. This plan is vital to help develop any plans for the area's future. The plan is now in final draft and the planners are getting ready to hold a public hearing on it before the plan goes to the city council for final approval.

Third, the city's new sewage treatment plant is completing its first year of operation. Also, the council has moved to have the sewer lines extended in the city and the first improvement district for the development of sewers (Marcy Acres Service District) was formed by property owners to tax themselves to get sewers.

Fourth, and the most recent step taken by the city officials, is the

Additional city park areas? Re-routing of Highway 26 out of the city? Types of new businesses? Removal of old buildings? A city recreational director? A city street improvement program?

These are just of few of the questions which could be asked.

The city council members have expressed a need to get guidance from city residents at many of the recent meetings. Such a survey could help.

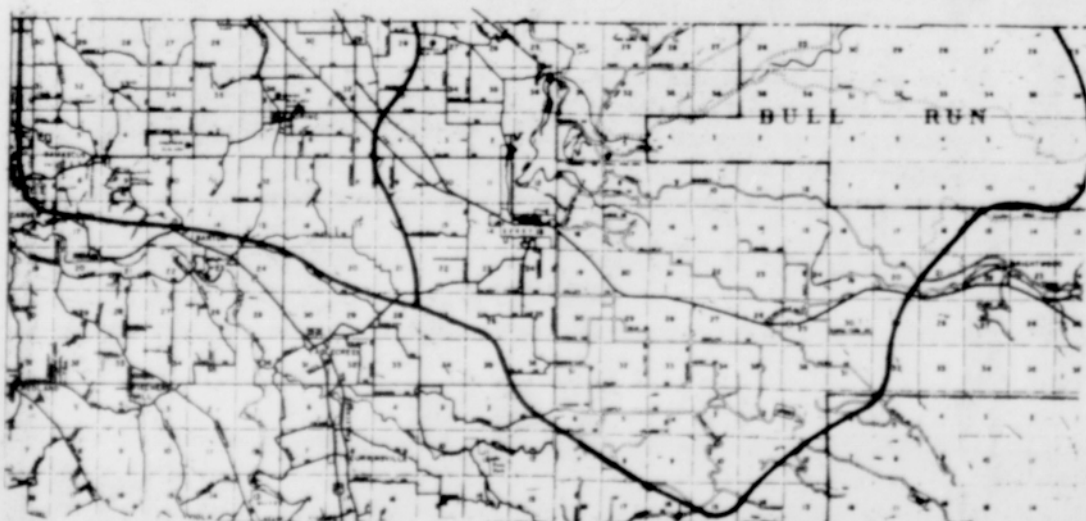
If we have national financial problems, why do we keep a huge standing in Europe?

High School sets election

Voters in the Gresham High School District will ballot Nov. 6 on a \$1,425,000 bond issue.

The money will be for a new wing to Barlow High School. It will be simply to accommodate the added enrollment, according to Harry Thompson, superintendent.

There will be no added courses or changes in programs, he said. It will cost the taxpayers not in excess of 30 cents per \$1,000 valuation the first year and the second year will drop to 18 cents because other bonded indebtedness for the district will be paid off by that time.

The tax rate in the district has dropped from \$6.18 per \$1,000 to \$5.18 this year. This is due to the increased valuation in the district and the added funds from the state.

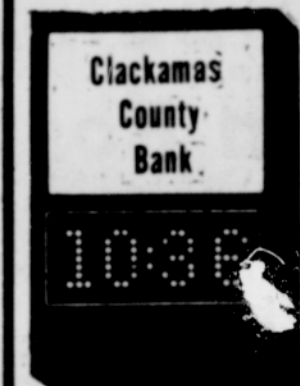

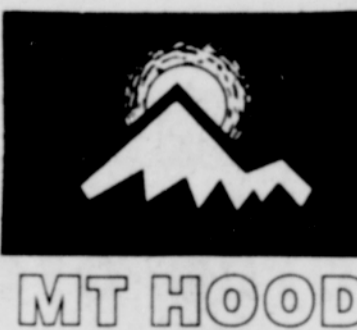

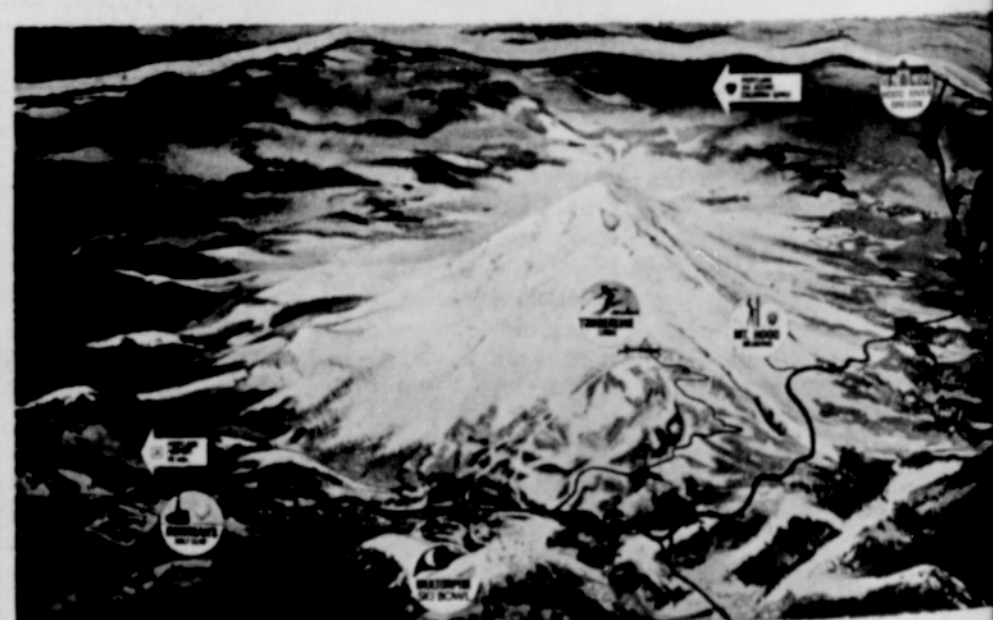
