Art exhibit now open

Oct. 22-Nov. 2 will feature a Latin American Exhibition. The display was formed by Cuban and Argentine artists, with works ranging from watercolors, acrylics, silkscreens, embossing, lithographs, drawings, oils and sculpture. This exhibition consists of polished ceramic pieces placed on wooden pedestals, then protected by plexiglas and encased in fur-lined stands. GREEN TOMATO MINCEMEAT
3 pints chopped apples
3 pints chopped green tomatoes
4 cups brown sugar
1 1/2 cups vinegar
3 cups raisins
3 teaspoons cinnamon
1 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon each mace, allspice, and nutmeg
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 cup butter or margarine
Mix apples and tomatoes and drain. Add remaining ingredients except butter. Bring to boiling point, simmer 3 hours. Add butter and let melt. Then seal.—From the files of Mrs. Edison Mills, Sandy.

2 eggs, beaten

2 Tablespoons each: celery seed, cinnamon, cloves, mustard seed, salt.
