Dog lovers beware of new control law

Clackamas County along with the rest of the state is now operating under a new dog control ordinance.

The new ordinance was passed by the 1973 Legislature and the Governor signed the bill (No. 2783) with the emergency clause attached.

Bike stolen

K. C. Swanson, 1706 NE Hogan, reported that a bike valued at \$106 had been stolen while visiting a friend.

Along with the new law, county dog control officer Ricard Wick, reminds residents that all dogs having their canine teeth are required to have and wear a current county dog license. Wick also emphasized that anyone with questions should contact the county office in Oregon City (655-8628).

The new ordinance reads: This defines a dog as a public nuisance if it: bites a person,

habitually chases vehicles or persons, damages or destroys property of persons other than the owner of the dog, scatters garbage, habitually trespasses on private property of persons other than the owner of the dog, disturbs any person by frequent or prolonged noises, is a female in heat and running at large or any dog found running at large.

Any Chief of Police, Constable, Sheriff or their deputies or other police officer shall

impound or cite the owner or keeper to court. This shall not apply, however, to the Herdman using the dogs for legitimate protection of his flock against the ravages of animals.

The impoundment charge is \$5 for the first offense and \$10 for each subsequent offense and the cost of board each time at the rate of \$2 per day. If cited, the fine can be \$10 for the first offense, and \$25 for each

additional offense. Unclaimed dogs may be sold after the fifth day.

The law also now reads: "The owner of any livestock which has been damaged by being wounded or killed by any dog shall have a cause of action against the owner of such dog for Double the full amount of the damage."
