What's Cooking?

CHICKEN FROM GRIPPIN'S KITCHEN

2 chicken breasts
1 can chicken noodle soup
1 can mushroom soup
3 slices day-old bread
1 egg, well beaten
1 medium onion

Boil chicken breasts seasoned with salt and pepper. Cook until tender. Let cool, pull meat from bones and cut into small pieces. Add the undiluted soups. Break up bread in small pieces. Stir in beaten egg and finely chopped onion. Stir all ingredients together and pour into buttered casserole. Top with cracker crumbs, paprika, or Chinese noodles. ORANGE

PINEAPPLE SALAD
2 pkgs jello (3 1/2 oz. ea.)
4 cups liquid
2 cups well-drained mandarin oranges

2 (8 oz.) or 1 (16 oz.) well-drained crushed pineapple
1 cup miniature marshmallows

Combine juices from drained fruit plus water (or apricot nectar) to make 4 cups. Bring 2 cups liquid to boil. Remove from heat and add jello stirring until dissolved. Add other 2 cups of liquid and stir. Let cool and add fruits and marshmallows. Serves 15.—From the files of Mrs. Marjorie White, Woodburn.

RAW APPLE CAKE

Put following in mixer:

2 eggs
2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup Wesson oil
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons soda
2 teaspoons cinnamon
Mix well. Add 2 1/2 cups sifted flour, 4 cups diced raw apples and 1 cup chopped nuts if

desired. Bake in a 9"x13" greased and floured pan at 350 degrees for 45-60 minutes or until it tests done. Leave in pan until cold. Cut into squares to serve. This is a complete and not-too-sweet very tasty dessert. It is especially good for those who like cake without frosting.—From the files of Mrs. Virginia Odom, Salem.

OLD FASHIONED

SOUR CREAM COOKIES
1 cup butter or margarine
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup white sugar
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract or orange peel, grated
3 eggs, slightly beaten
5 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup sour cream
Cream butter and sugars; add extract and eggs. Sift dry ingredients together; add alternately with sour cream to creamed mixture. Chill. Roll and cut into desired shapes. Round ones may be decorated with a drained one-half cherry. Bake at 375 degrees for 15 minutes or until lightly browned. About 5 dozen.—From the files of Mrs. Howard W. Berger, Sandy.

IRISH SCONES

2 cups flour
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
2 teaspoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 Tablespoons solid shortening
1/2 cup buttermilk
1 egg, beaten

Sift dry ingredients and mix shortening into it. Pour egg and milk in at once. Mix. Knead lightly six times on lightly floured dough board or cloth. Roll dough to 3/4-1" in a circle. Cut into diamond shapes about 3" across. Put on ungreased griddle over moderate heat. Cook until lightly browned and raised. They will be a little

lumpy. Turn and brown lightly. Serve with butter or jam. These are good hot or cold. Makes about 1 dozen. Store cold ones in covered container.—From the files of Mrs. Winnie Philben, the grandmother of Mrs. Susan Kirck, Sandy. Mrs. Philben was originally from County Mayo, Ireland. She migrated to Minnesota where she worked in a hotel. She became a friend of James J. Hill who built railroads into Oregon. These scones were his favorite breakfast food.

CHICKEN ON SUNDAY

1 can cream of celery soup
1 can cream of mushroom soup

1/2 cup milk
1 1/2 to 2 cups rice
Chicken pieces
1 envelope dry onion soup mix

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Heat soups and milk in saucepan. Cover bottom of greased 9" x 13" pan with rice. Pour soups over rice. Place chicken pieces on top, sprinkle with dry onion soup mix. Seal in foil. Bake 2 1/4 hours.
