

Councilmen to attend cities conference

Land use planning, revenue sharing, public transportation facilities and a variety of new state legislative actions affecting city government will be discussed by Oregon mayors, councilmen, planning commission members and other city officials at the 48th annual convention of the League of Oregon Cities, Nov. 11-13 in Portland.

More than 1,500 persons are expected to attend. This will include several city of Sandy councilmen.

Keynote speaker for the convention will be Mayor Pete Wilson of San Diego, Cal. Wilson, a former member of the California legislature and active in land use and shoreline protection legislative measures, will discuss "Land Use: The Crisis for Local Government" in his keynote address Monday morning, November 12.

Mayor Moon F. Landrieu of New Orleans, La., will deliver the banquet address. Mayor Landrieu, who is chairman of the Legislative Action Committee of U.S. Conference of Mayors, will discuss "The New Federalism: A Fading Vision?" in comments on federal revenue sharing and related proposals for federal government decentralization.

Other guest speakers will include Congressman John Dellenback of Oregon's Fourth Congressional District and Donald P. Hodel, administrator of Bonneville Power Administration. They will address convention luncheons on Tuesday and Monday respectively.

Special workshops are scheduled at the convention on the Fasano Court decision and its implications for city councils and planning commissions, new state sub-

division regulations, new state programs affecting railroad grade crossings within cities, new federal grant administrative procedures, and administrative procedures involved in distribution of federal revenue sharing checks.

Section meetings will be held for officials of large and small cities and for planning commission members, finance officers, mayors, city managers, city attorneys,

police chiefs, public works officials, municipal judges, building officials, parks and recreation officials and librarians.

Implementation of SB100, the state land use planning bill, will be discussed by Robert Davis, executive assistant to the Governor, at the morning session on Monday, Nov. 12. A companion session will feature discussion of the next highway bond issue and the proposed constitutional amendment

authorizing highways funds to be spent for mass transit.

Setting community goals and implementing the goals will be the subject of general sessions on Tuesday morning, Nov. 13. Speakers will discuss procedures for setting goals, financial measures for implementing them, and services and facilities needed for implementation of goals.

Election of officers to head the League for the coming year will be held at the annual

League business meeting on Tuesday morning, Nov. 13. Convention delegates will also act on resolutions at the business meeting.

The legislative interim committee on local government and transportation will hold a special hearing to discuss problems of cities on Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 13.

Traffic deaths decrease

Oregon's traffic death toll for the year continues to show a decrease over last year, with only two months remaining to be counted.

The Motor Vehicles Division reports that through October 553 people had been killed in traffic this year, a drop of slightly more than 12 per cent over the comparable period in 1972 when 631 had been killed.

Sixty-four people were killed in 55 fatal crashes last month. In October last year, 72 people

were killed in 61 fatal crashes. Sixteen of the October deaths occurred in just seven crashes, one of which killed four people when a bus and pickup camper collided. October's toll also included two animal-related accidents. A passenger in a car died when the vehicle struck a horse and the other collision between a car and a horse killed the rider of the horse.

DMV also noted that failure to use seat belts may have been a factor in at least 17 of the

October deaths.

Eighteen counties in the state recorded no traffic deaths last month. Lane county reported 11 fatalities; Multnomah, 6; Marion, 5; Coos, 5; Douglas, 4; Malheur, 4; Linn, 4; Clackamas, 4; Umatilla, 3; Josephine, 3; Deschutes, 3; Klamath, 3; Jackson, 2; Columbia, 2; and Yamhill, 2. Jefferson, Union and Washington counties each recorded one death.

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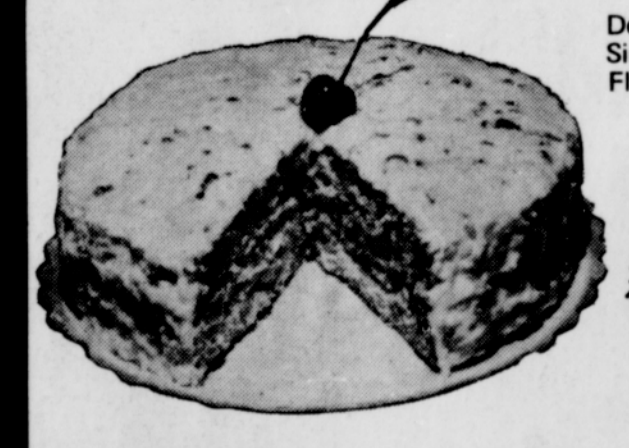
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OBITUARIES
