

Sandy FFA students scramble for calves

One of the conditions of the calf scramble is that the calf caught must be brought back to the P. I. and sold in the special auction for scramble calves the following year. This condition works to the kids' benefit

because the special auction prices are always higher than current market value.

With this in mind, Bruce now sets out to feed and condition his calf in preparation for next year's Pacific International Livestock Exposition.

Winter time means special care and feeding for horses. 4-H leaders of horse clubs can learn about this and other aspects of the 4-H horse program at a training meeting in the Arend Auditorium at OMSI Dec. 6 starting at 7:30 p.m., reports T. D. Zurcher, Clackamas County Extension Agent.

Defects to be found in horses will be shown in a movie entitled "Visual Defects Related to Unsoundness." A serious problem to horse health is bot flies which will be emphasized through the presentation of a set of slides prepared as a part of a 4-H Veterinary Science project entitled "Bot Flies in Horses."

A panel of resource people who will deal with various aspects of horse health and care and the 4-H horse project will be on the program according to Robert H. Stevely, Extension Agent from Columbia County. Dr. Brent Milleson of Wilsonville will deal with horse health as it relates to first aid and internal parasites. Dr. Zurcher will talk about nutrition of the horse. Jim Fraher, field man for Alber's

Feed Company will talk about commercial feeds. Kathy Van Dyke 4-H horse club leader and a member of the State 4-H Horse Advisory Committee, Forest Grove, will deal with rules and regulations of the horse and pony projects.

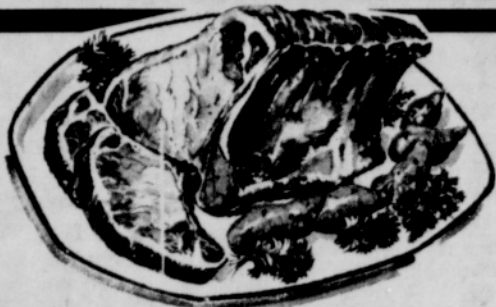

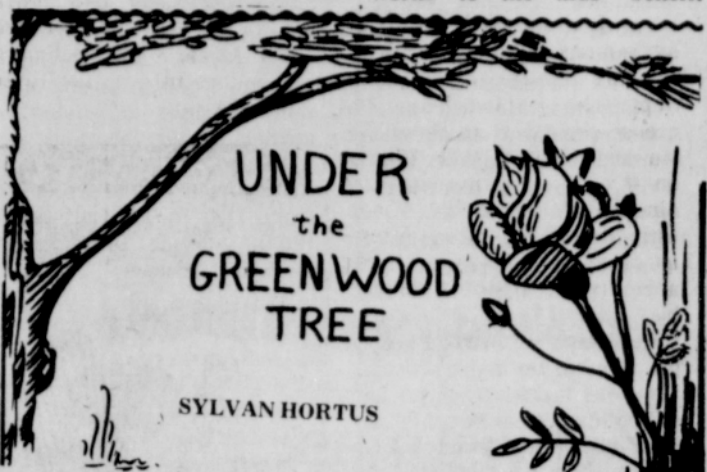

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UNDER the GREENWOOD TREE
SYLVAN HORTUS

MADRONE
The Madrone, *Arbutus Menziesii*, is a unique evergreen tree of the Pacific Coast. It is a broadleaved evergreen with large thick oval shaped leaves. The top of these leaves is a shiny green, while underneath they are somewhat hairy.

In spring, the tree has conspicuous blooms of white that hang in clusters. The scent is very pleasant. If fertilized by the bees which are attracted by the scent, these blossoms are followed by little round fruits which are quite hard and rough. Each fruit contains a large seed.

The bark of the Madrone is not resilient. Old bark is a reddish brown and very smooth. When the tree starts growth in early season and the cambium starts to expand, the bark has no elasticity and so, cracks. As the tree grows more of this bark is broken away in chunks. The new bark underneath is very light colored giving the tree with both old and new bark showing, a mottled look.

New Labels Delayed.
Processors of hot dogs and other cooked sausages have been given additional time to comply with new USDA labeling regulations so they can use their supplies of existing labels. So look for new labels with generic names ("bologna" or "frankfurter," for example), byproducts, if used, and binders, if present above specified percentages, by Jan. 1 instead of the previously published date, Sept. 7.

Free Consumer Information
Just off the press is the new edition of the federal government's consumer information index. It lists more than 200 publications that tell how to buy and care for a wide range of products such as appliances, automobiles, clothing, and food, and others on child care, health and safety, environmental protection and home maintenance. Many of

these are free, and so is the index. Write to Consumer Information, Pueblo, Colo. 81009 for your copy.

Miles Per Gallon
Information about fuel economy will be included on window stickers on many 1974 model cars. There is a close parallel between vehicle weight and fuel economy. Actual miles per gallon, of course, will depend on your driving habits, highway conditions, traffic situations, vehicle maintenance, and type of optional equipment, (air conditioning, for example). Check the information on the manufacturer's sticker as you make decisions about the new car you plan to buy.
