eyes the opposite direction and examine the amount of raw materials and products that we waste every year.

From household use, the daily garbage load has doubled in the last ten years. Annually, the U. S. junks nearly 7 million cars and this figure doesn't take into account the tires and used motor oil that are periodically tossed out during the life of the auto. Recycled paper products are gaining acceptance yet our nation reuses only 20 per cent of the 60 million tons of paper produced annually. Consider that some tree-shed European countries reprocess double these percentages.

Waste materials containing nitrogen, carbon and phosphorous are causing problems in some rivers and lakes as the normal aging process is "speeded up" by man-added materials. Food wastes moving through a garbage disposal to city sewers or eliminated directly from a processing plant, laundry waste water containing high phosphate detergents, fertilizers over-applied and unused by plants all can supply nutrients which if dumped in large enough quantity can affect our water quality.

We have been forcefully awakened to the energy we waste. For the first time, many of us are looking at thermostat settings on water and home heating systems. Warm air lost to the outside through poorly insulated walls and windows has taken on new significance. Some people are even starting to question a utility rate structure based on "the more you use, the less you pay."

Operation costs connected with the much-loved auto are being examined as never before.

As we start to examine our habits in the home and on the job, we can search out ways to recycle and reuse many of the items we normally tossed-out—thinking it more economical or convenient. We can build the word CONSERVE not only into our conversations but into our normal living patterns. The old adage "waste not, want not" is as applicable today as it was in grandmother's era.

Earnings up, hours down

Oregon's manufacturing production workers averaged \$4.64 per hour in October, the Employment Division's Research and Statistics section reported this week. This compared with \$4.62 in September, \$4.30 per hour in October, 1972, and the all-time high recorded in June, 1973 at \$4.67, the Employment Division reported.

The workweek of Oregon's production workers fell in October from 39.1 hours in September to 38.8 hours, and compared with 39.1 hours in October, 1972.

One of the causes for the shorter workweek was accounted for by Lumber and Wood Products workers who worked 39.2 hours in October as compared with 40.1 hours in September, the Division reported. Hourly earnings in Lumber and Wood Products averaged \$5.01 in October compared with \$5.02 in September and \$4.47 in October, 1972.

Contract Construction workers averaged 36.6 hours per week in October as compared with 37.4 hours in September and 36.0 hours in October, 1972. Earnings of construction workers in October averaged \$7.29 per hour as compared with \$7.31 in September and \$6.91 per hour in October, 1972, the Employment Division reported.
