Council discusses sewers, streets, lights, CRAG

The City of Sandy is looking to begin a program of improvements on streets and sewers.

The city council learned last week that a survey to inventory city streets and sidewalks was now nearing the completion

stage. Also city engineer Martin Boatwright is preparing a report on a program to repair defective sewer lines.

Further discussion on this subject will be on the agenda at the adjourned council meeting slated for Dec. 17, 7 p.m., at the city hall.

According to city administrator Carl Hatfield, the city has been involved in talks with the State Highway Department concerning pedestrian lights on both Main Street and Proctor Avenue. The state is to return to the city projected costs of the two lights.

One light would be placed at the intersection near the U.S. Post Office on Main Street and the other on Proctor Avenue in front of Clackamas County Bank. Both would be controlled by pedestrians and would have the standard red, yellow and green lights.

No definite plans for the lights have been made awaiting the cost projections.

Boatwright told the council the city must prepare a report for the Department of Environmental Quality by July 1, 1974 on plans for making corrections to defective sewer lines.

Councilmen Joe Astleford and Ed Burke both expressed the need for this report to also relate to any street improvement projects.

Astleford indicated possibly that improvement work on the sewers could be coincided with street improvement and sidewalk work.

This also will be continued at the adjourned meeting Monday night.

Boatwright indicated it appears federal matching funds were more readily available for new sewer line construction rather than for these improvement projects to the sewer line.

The council also discussed information obtained from Columbia Region Association of Governments (CRAG). According to Hatfield, CRAG has stated the City of Sandy will grow to a population of 9,000 and also 9,000 residents will reside in the outlying areas.

Hatfield expressed concern that CRAG was trying to plan for the city without consulting the city council's plans.

Councilman Burke was appointed as the official representative for the city to CRAG.

Fuel theft thwarted

People are getting desperate about fuel shortages in many ways.

Last week an attempt was made to steal a tanker truck owned by the Mt. Hood Oil Company, according to Gresham Police reports.

Three employees of the Mt. Hood Oil Company were eating lunch when they heard the sound of one of the fuel trucks starting. They observed a man sitting in the driver's seat who was not employed with the company.

State land commission seeks citizen input

L.B. Day, chairman of the Land Conservation and Development Commission announced that the Commission will soon form the State Citizen Involvement Advisory Committee, required by Senate Bill 100, to assist the Commission in obtaining widespread citizen involvement in all phases of the planning process.

The Commission will be responsible for recommending to the Commission a program that promotes and enhances public participation in the development of state-wide planning goals and guidelines. The Commission must also review the proposed citizen involvement programs of local government submitted by the counties and the Columbia Region Association of Governments, and recommend to the Commission whether or not the proposed program adequately provides for public involvement in the planning process.

The Commission will appoint a committee of 9-11 members broadly representative of the geographic areas of the state and of interests relating to land use and land use decisions. The members will serve for a one-year term, and may be reappointed for subsequent terms. The Commission is asking for suggestions of individuals who

would be willing to serve on this committee. Suggestions are needed before the Commission's December 13th meeting, when they hope to make the committee appointments. Recommendations may be sent to L.B. Day, Chairman, Land Conservation and Development Commission, 240 Cottage Street, S.E., Salem, Ore. 97310.

The Commission is also interested in any suggestions regarding citizen involvement programs. Day urged that anyone who has recommendations for citizen involvement send them to the Commission.

The next meeting of the Land Conservation and Development Commission is scheduled for Thursday, Dec. 13 at 10:30 a.m. in the Governor's Conference Room at the Capital Building in Salem.

Items on the agenda include: Citizen Involvement Advisory Committee; general business; and an executive session to discuss personnel matters.

Bank debits show increase

Bank debits for the 23 reporting banks including Clackamas County were up in October, 1973, compared to October 1972, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business Research has reported.

Debits for October 1973, totaled \$259,031,000. For September, 1973, the total was \$225,010,000 (revised) and for October 1972, the total was \$200,137,000.

Oregon, with 426 banks reporting, had a percentage

increase of 18.3 in October 1973, as compared with September 1973, and a 4.4 percentage increase in October 1973, the total was \$8,270,880,000 and for October 1972, the total was \$6,729,142,000.
