Strawberry grower to be honored

The Oregon Strawberry Commission has voted to continue a program of offering special recognition to the state's top strawberry producers.

The commission met Dec. 19 and decided to continue the program which was reinstated last year. The program had been dropped for several years before that.

To qualify a grower must have produced at least six tons of berries per acre on a minimum of 10 acres.

Presentations will be made during "Small Fruits Day" at the Northwest Horticultural Show in Portland late in January.

The commission also conducted its annual review of

research during the meeting. Reports were made on strawberry research projects being carried out at Oregon State University and the North Willamette Experiment Station. Possible new research projects also were reviewed.

Commissioners were told several new varieties, being tested by the university and the experiment station in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, are showing great promise as high quality berries adaptable to processing.

During the meeting, the commission re-elected its present officers for 1973-74. The chairman is Jack Ouchida, of Gresham.

Mt. Hood slates class on occult

Zigzag Ranger Station announces new hours

The Zigzag Ranger Station office will be closed Dec. 31 and Jan. 1 for the holiday according to James Olsen, district ranger.

In addition, beginning Jan. 6, the office will not be open on Sundays. The Forest Service will provide maps and recreation information on a bulletin board and a literature rack in front of the office.

Effective Jan. 7, the new office hours for the Zigzag Station will be 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Olsen also said that Forest Service personnel will re-examine the Sunday office needs in the spring as the effects of the gasoline shortage are assessed.

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Identification cards to aid non-drivers

The Motor Vehicles Division will begin taking applications for identification cards Jan. 2.

Those who want to apply for the ID cards must apply in person at a DMV field office. Arrangements may also be made in advance to have a field representative visit centers for the handicapped or elderly to take applications.

Authority for the division to issue ID cards was approved by the 1973 Legislature. The cards are meant to aid non-drivers who want identification for check cashing and other purposes.

The cards will be printed on the same form as a driver's license, with the computer-written phrases "Identification Card Only" at the top and "Not a License to Drive" at the bottom of the form.

Fees for ID cards will depend on how close to the applicant's birthday the original card is issued.

Original fees will range from \$1.50 to \$3.50. ID cards will be renewable for a \$2 fee and, after the original card, will expire on the holder's birthday every two years.

Applicants must furnish documentary proof of age, such as a birth certificate. There is no age restriction for an ID card.

Input sought to help pick planning director

Interested citizens will have an opportunity to answer that question at a public meeting of

the Administrative Committee of the Planning Commission to be held at the County Health Department Auditorium on Jan. 3, at 7:30 p.m.

The Administrative Committee, headed by Jack

Courtney, Milwaukie, will wrestle with the problem of setting up qualifications and criteria for the screening and selection of a new planning director for Clackamas County.

The present director, Jim Hall, has resigned and will leave that post Feb. 1.

Under present legislation, the Board of County Commissioners will make the final selection, but the planning commission has been asked to

handle the task of setting up criteria, screening and narrowing applicants down to three or four.

The commissioners will then conduct further screening and make the final selection.

Neighborhood and other citizen organizations and individual citizens are urged to attend the meeting on Jan. 3 and submit any ideas, comments and suggestions they might have and from this input, the administrative committee

will then start the selection process.
