

Project Second Wind:

Area students solicit canned foods for poor

Students from five area high schools will participate in Project Second Wind this weekend.

Second Wind is a door to door canvass for canned foods in order to replenish the stocks of

the emergency food centers in the community.

Coordinators for the high schools include:

Kenna Jones, Gresham High; Terri Anderson, Sandy High; Vicki Lowry, Barlow High; Brenda Hawes, Centennial High; and Debbie Haskett, Reynolds High.

This year marks the fourth Second Wind drive.

In 1971 the drive collected 21 tons of food. In 1972 the amount was raised to 64 tons, and last year 84 tons were collected; thus bringing the total of the three drives to 170 tons of food.

Students in the Gresham High area, according to Kenna Jones, can meet in the Gresham High parking lot both Saturday and Sunday at 8:20 a.m.

National Guard and Army reserve trucks will leave at 8:30 to transport students to various neighborhoods in the area. The drive will end at 4:30 p.m. each

day.

After the canned goods have been collected, the trucks will take the food to warehouses on Swan Island where it will be sorted by more student volunteers.

The following weekend, March 2 and 3, the goods will be picked up from the warehouses and delivered to the designated agencies. The National Guard and Army Reserve will again donate the use of their trucks for this transport.

In order to recruit canvassers, a slide show showing shots of last year's drive will be presented to the students of several schools.

An attempt will be made this year to include students from Dexter McCarty and Rockwood middle schools.

Posters and armbands have also been distributed in some participating high schools.

Second Wind is an attempt to feed people of the community who might otherwise go hungry.

According to one participating student: "Project Second Wind allows the volunteers to give a little of their time to help feed a lot of hungry people."

Committee fights

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Farm Bureau rules on farm buildings

Farm outbuildings are not commercial buildings or dwellings and should not be subject to proposed rules establishing a state uniform building code, according to the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation.

Speaking in Salem at a hearing held by the state director of commerce and the state fire marshal, Farm Bureau Executive Vice President David S. Nelson on Monday (Feb. 4) testified that inclusion of farm buildings was not the intent of SB 73, the enabling legislation passed in the 1973 regular session. He said the Farm Bureau learned in November that farm outbuildings were included for consideration by the code advisory board.

He submitted a letter from Senator Richard Groener of Milwaukie, chairman of the Labor and Industries Com-

mittee, which introduced the bill.

Groener wrote, "at no time did we intend to include farm outbuildings in the scope of this act, unless they involved an immediate risk of death or injury to an owner, tenant or worker."

Nelson testified that farm outbuildings are conceded to be those which shelter livestock, poultry, feed and equipment and those which are used for normal farming purposes. They do not include dwellings, packing houses or processing activities, he said.

Nelson also stated that farmers usually build their outbuildings by degrees as time and work permit. He said inspections at each stage would inflict unnecessary hardship on food producers who would be forced to delay completion of construction, perhaps for a year.

He indicated that the Farm Bureau representatives will testify against the farm outbuilding provision of the rules at each of the 11 hearings scheduled during February at various locations in the state.

Manpower center not moving

Rumors of an immediate move to Portland by the Manpower Training Center at Springdale are apparently unfounded.

"We're not moving that I know of," said one source at the job trainings school's Portland office.

The official added that they hope eventually to have the Portland Residential Manpower Training Center under one roof, especially with the current gas shortage.

"We're looking for a new site but we're still in the 'just hoping' stage," said the source.

The Springdale facility has housed young men since the inception of the program several years ago. Girls are in a building in Portland.

What's Cooking?

ONIONS AU GRATIN

4 cups coarsely sliced onions
6 Tbsps shortening
3 Tbsps flour
1½ cups milk
¾ teaspoon salt
¼ cup grated American Cheese

3 Tbsps melted butter
¼ teaspoon paprika
¼ teaspoon celery salt
¾ cup dry bread crumbs

Saute onions in hot shortening in heavy frying pan; remove onions. Make sauce: Blend in flour; add milk gradually; cook until thick, stirring constantly.

Combine sauce, onions, salt, paprika and celery salt. Pour into buttered 1½ quart casserole—sprinkle top with combined bread crumbs, cheese, and butter.

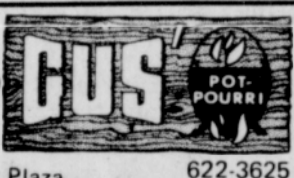
Bake in 375 degree oven about 20 minutes or until slightly browned. Serves 6.—From the files of Mrs. Howard W. Berger, Sandy.

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
