Classes offered on business

The Small Business Administration, Clackamas Community College, Tri City Chamber of Commerce, and North Clackamas Chamber of Commerce are offering two courses for small businessmen spring term.

A small business bookkeeping course will begin Tuesday, March 26, and run until June 4. It will cover the basic requirements necessary to maintain a simple, practical bookkeeping system for a small business. Step-by-step procedures will be given on the proper form and uses of a journal ledger balance sheet income statement and fund-flow statement. Bookkeeping for tax and credit purposes will also be covered.

Money management in the business is a course beginning Thursday, March 28, and lasting until June 6. Subjects covered will be managing money, to include acquiring capital; planning the finances of a small business, to include budgeting; and use of financial information in managing a business. The class will participate in actual business problems.

Reforestation program proves helpful

In a continuous battle with brush, rodents, drought and frost, the massive artificial reforestation programs currently underway in Oregon are winning the war and insuring Oregon's future citizens of an important forest resource and economic base.

In 1972, over 150,000 acres in Oregon were planted with about 50 million seedlings and thousands of pounds of seed. These 150,000 acres of artificially reforested lands will eventually provide the timber growth that will annually supply enough fiber to build

about 9,000 homes, protect the high quality of Oregon's water, support continued outdoor recreation and insure economic and employment opportunities.

There are a number of artificial methods for obtaining reforestation. Seeding from helicopters and airplanes or on

foot is one. But reforestation through direct planting of seedlings is more common and requires intensive human effort.

Seedlings are carried in a backpack and are placed in the ground at varying intervals throughout the harvested area.

Spring comes to mountains

Spacing may vary from six feet to ten feet depending on management objectives, ecological conditions and species of tree seedling used.

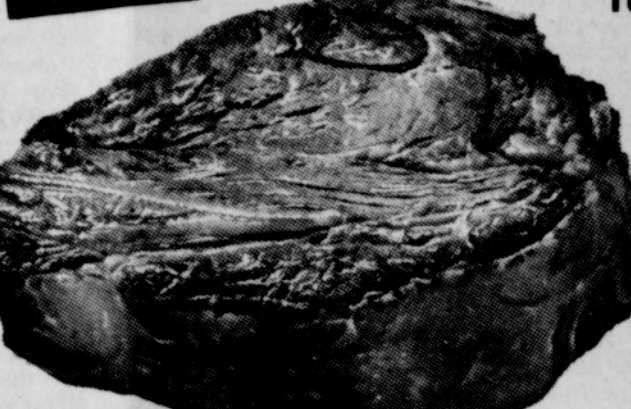

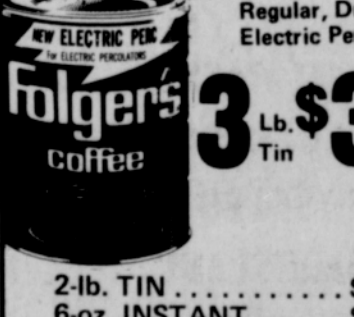
