This year Teen Leaders, older 4-H members leading their own clubs, are welcomed for their continued leadership in 4-H.

There will be two \$250.00 scholarships awarded to high school seniors active in 4-H presented by the leaders association fund. There will be two special community awards presented, one each to an individual and business which have been strong supporters of the 4-H program.

The leaders association officers of 1974-75 are to be installed at the meeting.

They are president, Joanne Wilkie; vice president, Kenneth Blodgett; secretary, Judy Stritzke; treasurer, Walter Evens. Council members are Marcella Warren, Richard Miller, Elnora Herndon, Ralph Gierke, Carol Jean Eddy, Marlys Chitwood.

Entertainment will be special music by "Estacada Ensemble" from Estacada High School, directed by Richard Troeh, and a baton duet by Toni Woods and Elaine Thompson. Special speaker is Men Meier, executive director of Oregon 4-H Foundation.

He will speak and show slides of the 4-H Educational Center near Salem. This 700 acre tract of land has been purchased and will be improved through donations. Toastmaster is Mike Burton of Carus, who has been active in 4-H leadership over six years.

There are 3500 4-H members in the county with more club leaders than any other county in the state. Membership is continually growing in the 40 4-H projects available. The horse club project is the most rapidly growing at the present time.

There is always a project available for every interest and need of all rural and urban youth. 4-H is an excellent opportunity for boys and girls in an out of school educational program for ages 9 through 19. It provides development of youth into useful citizens.

Timber sales reported

Timber sales on national resource lands in Oregon during February amounted to \$21.9 million, Bureau of Land Management officials reported today.

The February sales of 12.7 million board feet of timber to be cut over three years brings the total advertised sales for Fiscal Year 1974 (July through June) to \$107 million.

In comparison, the greatest amount ever bid for timber from BLM-managed lands in Oregon was \$130.3 million in 1973.

Herbert L. Haglund, chief of BLM Oregon state office's branch of forestry, reported that BLM Oregon district sales in February were:

Salem, 43.3 million board feet, \$6,821,336; Eugene, 30.2 mbf, \$6,430,863; Roseburg, 13.5 million mbf, \$1,916,494; Coos Bay, 17.8 mbf, \$3,791,948; and Medford, 22.9 mbf, \$3,028,802.

Archie Craft, BLM state director, noted that income from this renewable resource is shared with the 18 western Oregon counties.

Police arrest Portland men

The Sandy Police arrested two Portland residents early Saturday morning on drug charges and for unlawful possession of a weapon.

James Arthur Henrie II, 27, was arrested for criminal activity and possession of amphetamines and cocaine.

Mark Daniel McClure, 22, was arrested for driving under the influence of drugs and unlawful possession of a weapon.

Both subjects are presently being lodged in the Clackamas County Jail and are awaiting trial. All property confiscated by the police was taken to the Clackamas County crime lab for analysis.
