Historical society plans afternoon program

The month of March is going out with a fifth Sunday which means an afternoon program will be held by the Clackamas County Historical Society (CCHS).

It is customary to have a daytime meeting in any month having a fifth Sunday to make it possible for those to attend who cannot make the night meetings.

March also is the birthday month of a past president and long time member, E.L. (Roy) Meyers, who will be 90 years of

age March 27. It is planned to make Sunday's meeting, March 31, a special occasion with Meyers as the guest of honor.

He will be presented with a certificate of appreciation by the society for his many contributions for the furtherance of Oregon history by his 60 years of study, his many talks, writings, four large scrapbooks and his enthusiastic, lively and inspiring manner of presenting his knowledge.

Meyers has been an

Oregonian since 1900. He married and lived at Eagle Creek for 54 years on property adjoining that of his father-in-law, Egbert N. Foster, son of Philip Foster, the man who with Sam Barlow hacked out the beginning of the famed Barlow Road.

The route was constructed on south side of Mt. Hood as a means by which the emigrants could bring their wagons, families and goods to the valley from a departure point at The Dalles, rather than

by way of the long and costly route down the Columbia River with its treacherous rapids.

Philip Foster, who died in 1884, was a great writer and left among his possessions a trunk containing 1000 papers consisting of letters, documents and all manner of stories and data on the migration and life of Oregon pioneers.

From these papers which the family gave him, Meyers gleaned invaluable information and stimulus for further study of Oregon. The

original papers were given to the Oregon Historical Society and duplicate ones to the CCHS. Sunday's meeting will include a talk by Meyers on interesting historical things dear to his heart.

Refreshments will follow with Mrs. Albert (Ruth) Powers serving a birthday cake provided by her. Mrs. Powers is also a proponent of Oregon history and well known for her work in restoring and preserving lovely old homes in the area.

All friends of Meyers and the interested public are invited to the 2 p.m. meeting at the Mertie Stevens guest house, 607 Washington St., Oregon City.
