Veteran's tax deadline told

Disabled war veterans and veterans' widows must apply for their annual Oregon property tax exemptions by April 1, Juanita Orr, Clackamas County Assessor cautioned today. Application is filed with the county assessor.

Mrs. Orr said the exemption amounts to \$7500 of the true cash value of the property. Entitled are war veterans 40 per cent or more disabled, and unmarried widows of war veterans.

She said this is not an automatic exemption. Even though an exemption was granted last year, the property owner must file a new application to be considered for the exemption this year.

If the tax payer still has property tax to pay on his residence after the veterans' exemption, and has an income of less than \$5,000 a year, he is eligible for a refund under the new homeowners and renters property tax refund program passed by the 1973 legislature. Application for this benefit must be filed by April 15 with the Department of Revenue, Salem.

Correspondence course set for parents

How important are your child's "baby" teeth? What makes immunization work against disease? How can you help your doctor more effectively?

Cal Robertson, Multnomah County Extension agent will conduct a correspondence course in a series of three lessons beginning April 8. The course will cover preventive dentistry, immunization, and how to work with your doctor.

The course is directed to homemakers with children 3 to 12 years old and will answer questions frequently asked by mothers concerning child's health.

The lessons will be sent to homemakers at two week intervals. Brief assignments with each lesson will be completed by the participant and returned to the Extension Office before she begins the next segment.

Homemakers who would like to register for the health course should call the Multnomah County Extension Office, 229-

4830; or the Clackamas County Extension Office, 665-9631. The final date for accepting registration is April 29, 1974.

awards. Stan Kenton was the third person elected to the Downbeat Magazine Hall of Fame following Louis Armstrong and Duke Ellington.

BEEF STROGANOFF
1 1/2 lbs. round steak, cut 1/4 inch thick
1/4 to 1/2 lb. (1 pt. box) fresh mushrooms, sliced, or 1 (8 oz.) can sliced mushrooms
1 can (10 1/2 oz.) beef broth or 2 bouillon cubes dissolved in 1-1 1/2 cups hot water
1/4 cup Crisco oil
3/4 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup sherry or water
3 Tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup (1/2 pt.) commercial sour cream
Rice or noodles
Parsley, if desired for garnish.

Cut steak into 1/4 inch strips. Brown in a large skillet in hot oil. Push meat to side of skillet; add mushrooms and onion; cook until tender but not brown. Stir in beef broth. Cover and simmer about 1 hour, until meat is tender. Add sherry. Combine flour and salt with sour cream; stir into mixture in skillet. Simmer uncovered about 15 minutes. Serve on rice or noodles. If desired, garnish with parsley. Serves 6.—From the files of Mrs. Howard Berger, Sandy.

1/2 cup chopped nuts
In a medium-sized bowl combine oil, sugars, eggs, salt, vanilla, flour, and rolled oats. Spread in a greased 9-inch square pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes. Cool slightly.
