Congressmen take close look at East County berry field

There were no 12-year-olds pulling berry buckets behind them, but two US Congressmen Friday got a close look at the type of strawberry field where East County kids have traditionally picked.

Rep. Herman Badillo, D-N.Y., and Dominick Daniels, D-N.Y., joined Rep. Edith Green of the 3rd District and several other local officials on a tour of the Bob Burlingame field, located on Stark Street east of 242nd Avenue.

The visit followed a public hearing in Portland Thursday where the US House Select Subcommittee on labor was barraged with testimony from opponents of recently passed federal legislation prohibiting children under 12 from working in berry fields.

Reps. Badillo and Daniels are both members of the committee. Mrs. Green is serving as an active member of the subcommittee during the hearings.

Burlingame explained his hiring practices to the congressmen during the visit to the field. Also on display were the buckets kids use to pick berries.

Following the stop in East County, the congressmen continued on a loop tour of Mt. Hood.

At the hearing Thursday, Mrs. Green told the committee that allowing youngsters to pick creates adult jobs. More people are needed to process berries, she explained. Mothers who now pick berries might not be able to if their children were not allowed in the fields.

A berry grower told the committee that if children under 12 are not allowed to pick, a substantial percentage of next year's harvest might rot on the vine.

A court injunction against the ban enabled youngsters to pick berries the past year.

Mrs. Green produced data showing that without the injunction pickers would have lost an estimated \$1,386,000, cannery workers would have lost \$4 million and 9,000 tons of berries would have rotted in the fields.

It was pointed out that allowing children to pick would seldom interfere with school work, since strawberry season doesn't generally start until June.

In the Gresham Grade School District, of course, year-round school is in effect and children could only pick during their three week breaks in between nine-week sessions.

"All Things Bright and Beautiful," by James Herriot

A delight from beginning to end, and as the last chapter draws to its close you'll find yourself wishing it didn't have to—end.

Mr. Herriot is a veterinary surgeon in Yorkshire, in the north of England. And this book, as well as "All Creatures Great And Small" which preceded it, is the enchanting story of his encounters with his fellow-creatures, winged, finned, furred, or human.

As fresh as the breezes blowing through the Yorkshire Dales, there is nothing in the book that cannot be read by the children in the family; but they will have to re-read it when grown to fully appreciate the gentle humor (at the expense of none) and the delicious glimpses of human nature, for this is an adult book in the best sense of the term.

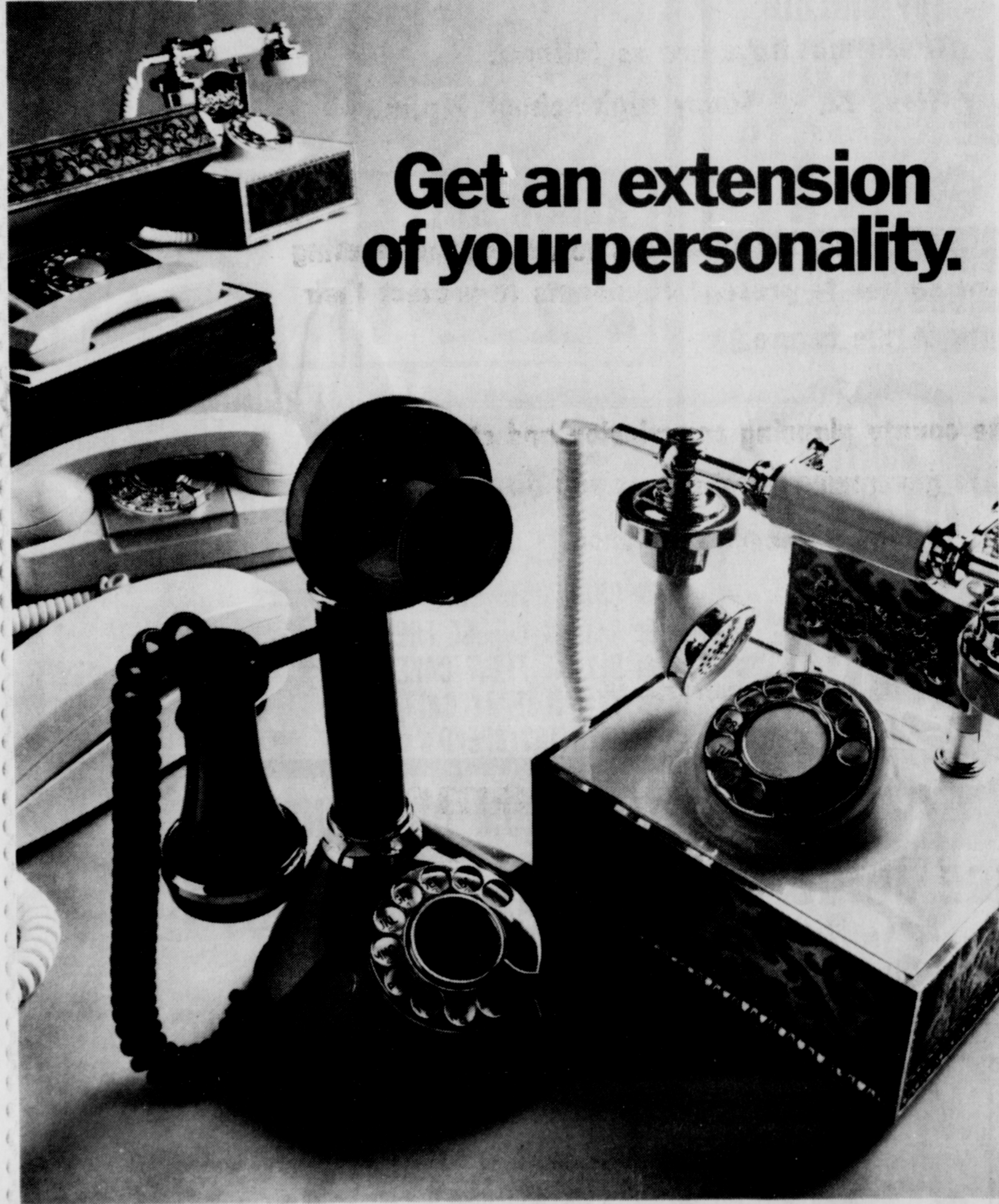
The next meeting of Clackamas Lodges will be held at Sandy I.O.O.F. Hall on May 3, 1975.
