

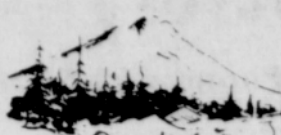

While in Honduras the boys did many things to help out on the mission field and saw missionary life as it really is.

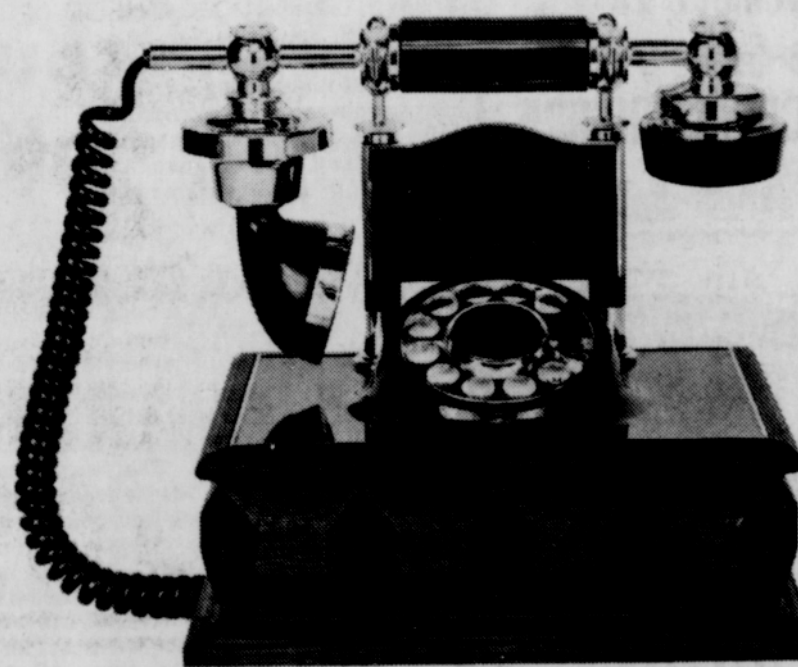
They took many slides, and will share these slides at the program.

James Earl Jones, Rt. 4 Box 1654, Boring, got in his pickup truck to go to work Saturday morning.

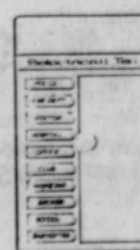
But the truck wouldn't move. During the night someone had stolen his drive shaft, according to sheriff's reports. Value was placed at \$75.



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
