Tri-Met ridership increases

Preliminary estimates of riders since Tri-Met's new reduced fare program went into effect Jan. 13 show a steady daily increase.

Daily ridership last February at the height of the gas shortage averaged out at 84,000.

Since Jan. 13 it has varied from 86,000 to 88,000 daily riders.

Tri-Met reduced fares to a flat 35 cents and made rides in downtown Portland free. Increased ridership is expected to compensate for reduced revenue from each fare.

Eagle Creek statement ready

The final environmental statement for the Eagle Creek Planning Unit is available for review, according to Mt. Hood National Forest Supervisor Wright T. Mallory.

The final statement proposed land use allocations and management direction for 75,260 acres of national forest land in Multnomah and Hood River Counties, Oregon.

Review copies of the statement are available at all local and college libraries, the Columbia Gorge and Hood River Valley ranger stations, the Mt. Hood National Forest

supervisor's office and the Forest Service Pacific Northwest Regional Office. Check-out copies are also available at

New site requested for MHCC classes

Mt. Hood Community College will go before the Multnomah County Planning Commission in a public hearing Tuesday to request approval for extension of classes to the former Marycrest High School.

Mt. Hood will request the commission's approval, so that they can hold classes at the Western States Chiropractic College (formerly Marycrest). The college is asking for an expansion of the community service use, to include a shared use of the site by both colleges. WSCC is located at 2900 NE 132nd Ave.

Mt. Hood has an option to purchase the campus from the WSCC, subject to this and other approvals.

If approved by the commission, Mt. Hood and WSCC would share the school, WSCC using it during the day, and Mt. Hood holding classes there at night.

Mt. Hood would gradually take over all facilities, during a five-year phased purchase plan. WSCC is planning to purchase a new, more compact campus facility.

Enrollment at the site would increase to an overall total of 1,000 students, with 500 being on the site at one time.

Mt. Hood also requests approval of an increase in parking facilities at WSCC from the present 150 to 650 spaces.

The hearing is set for 2 p.m. in Room 602 of the Multnomah County Courthouse.
