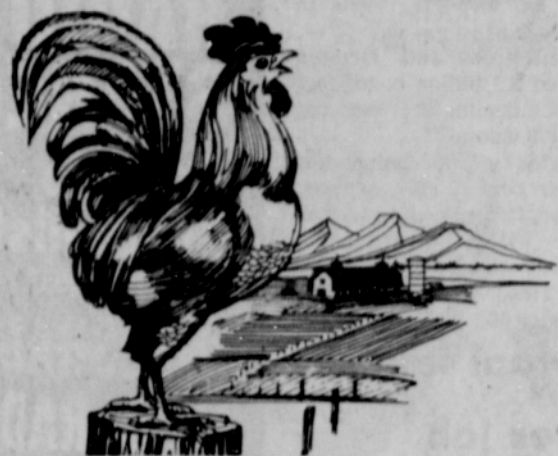


Large crowd hears director of Jehovah

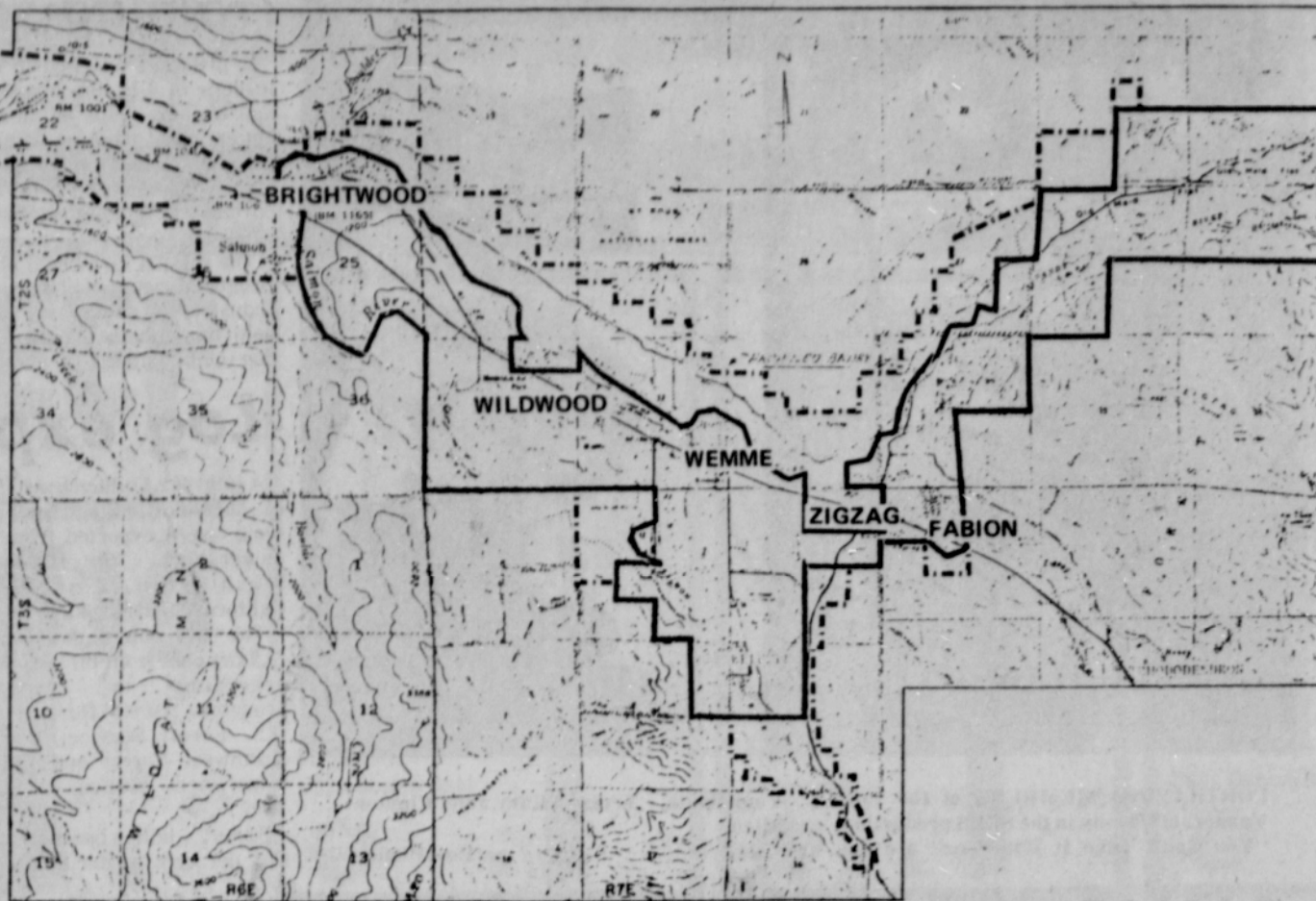

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THE MT. HOOD Loop Water District is proposing an expanded service district as outlined above. A public hearing on the annexation proposal will be held Wednesday, March 19, at 7:30 p.m. at Sandy Union High School.

Mt. Hood Water District proposes 13 acre expansion

Residents from Alder Creek to Rhododendron and down Truman Road and out Lolo Pass Road would be included in the Mt. Hood Loop Water District's expansion proposal.

The Mt. Hood Loop Water District board has already agreed to purchase the following existing water systems: the Salmon Valley Water Company, the Timberline Rim Co. water system, the Zig Zag Village water system, River Rapids system.

Under expansion plans, Alpine North's pipe will be incorporated and its well will be abandoned. A small portion of the Burbank Water Company

and the Riverwood Water Corporation will be included. Inclusion of the Zigzag Ranger Station system and its 30,000 gallon reservoir is subject to negotiation.

Some small portions of the Rhododendron Summer Homes systems in the Mt. Hood Woodlands area will be incorporated. Annexation plans also call for the replacement of the Faubion Summer Homes Association system.

Other systems to be incorporated are the Welches Water Cooperative system, River Bluff Park's distribution line, the Golf Club Corporation system, the Mt. Hood Wildwood Annex, B and C Acres, the Mountain Air Park system, a small portion of the Brightwood system, the Hood Hideaways system, the Brookwood system, Arrah Wana Estates No. 2 system's piping, portions of the North Brightwood Improvement Association, a small portion of the Mt. Hood Country Club Water Company, the Salmon River Park Improvement District, and Jettview Acres pipe.

The Dorner and Tunks study states none of the Sleepy Hollow System can be salvaged.

Spring sign-up starts at Pioneer craft school

Registrations are now being accepted for the 10 week spring term beginning March 31 at the Damascus Pioneer Craft School. All class sessions are from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

On Tuesday spinning, stitching and quilting are offered. Wednesdays include weaving, knitting and crocheting and bobbin lace making.

In the lace making class the student is taught how to construct the lace-making pillow or cushion.

Off-loom weaving and Navajo weaving are offered on Thursdays. Friday's classes feature basketry and spinning.

Spinning classes introduce the beginner to spinning wheels of various designs and includes sorting and washing a fleece, some vegetable dyeing and spinning exotic fibers. Wheels are furnished or students may use their own.

The off-loom class covers construction of and basic tapestry techniques on a frame loom; band weaving using inkle looms, cards, rigid heddle and finger weaving techniques.

Quilting classes include piecing and quilting sample designs and advanced quilting techniques and mounting quilts

of frames. The stitching, knitting and crochet classes take the student from beginning stitches through planning and executing advanced designs. The basketry students start with basic basketry techniques and advance to woven shapes.

For further information please call or write the school staff and students will be at OMST's wool show March 29 and 30 and April 5 and 6 with exhibits and demonstrations.

"No Surrender: My Thirty Year War"

by Hiroo Onoda
Mental gymnastics is an ever-popular sport, indulged in by true believers of many persuasions, including people in love. This is the story of one man's dogged training and olympic quality performance in that sport.

For 30 years Mr. Onoda convinced himself that despite all evidence to the contrary, Japan and the United States were still at war. Therefore, as a loyal son and soldier of Japan he refused to surrender.

His long, clandestine sojourn in the Philippines could have made an exciting and intriguing saga of survival—a la Robinson Crusoe. This telling, unfortunately, isn't. Rather it is an apology for what Onoda perceives as an exercise in logic and loyalty; that others might see it as stupidity the autobiographer seems only too well aware. He was right: I, for one, certainly do.

That Japan should honor him is perhaps pathetic, but kindly. That the Philippines should do so is grotesque.

For three decades this man had sniped at innocent citizens, raided their stores and burned their rice.

Something for everybody here: a curse for lovers of the occult and-or Gothic romances, true love for the perennial optimists among us, and quasi-incest for those who like a little sex thrown in to liven things up. (I don't know what quasi-incest means either—it's a term I made up to describe the love affair between a man, who, along with his half-sister, was raised by his father's mistress, and the daughter of his mother's lover.)

If that isn't crystal clear to you, read the book which makes it reasonably easy to follow, although a little hazy when it comes to delineating character.

Ms. Cookson also seems a bit hazy about human reactions and dialogue—as when she has new grandparents discussing, for three full pages, the birth of triplets to their daughter—and no one asks or tells the sex of these wonder children.

If you happen to like simplistic stereotypes (the two blonds in this trio are angelic; guess what the one with BLACK hair is?) this is your book. It bored me to yawns and I only plowed through it from a sense of duty—so I could tell you if it gets better as the pages go by. It doesn't.

The play school provides an opportunity for the pre-schoolers to experience school in a limited way to meet and work with other children.

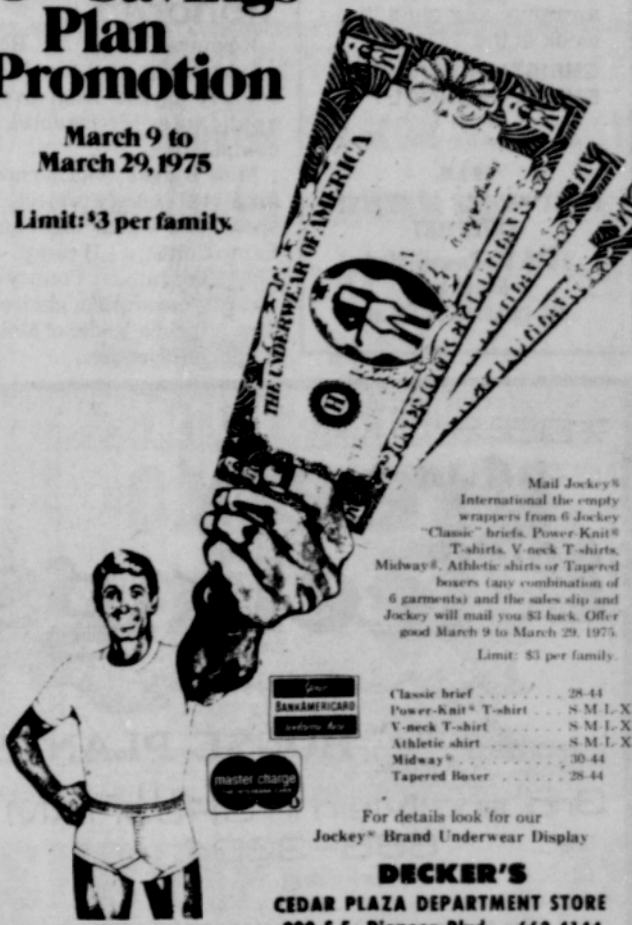

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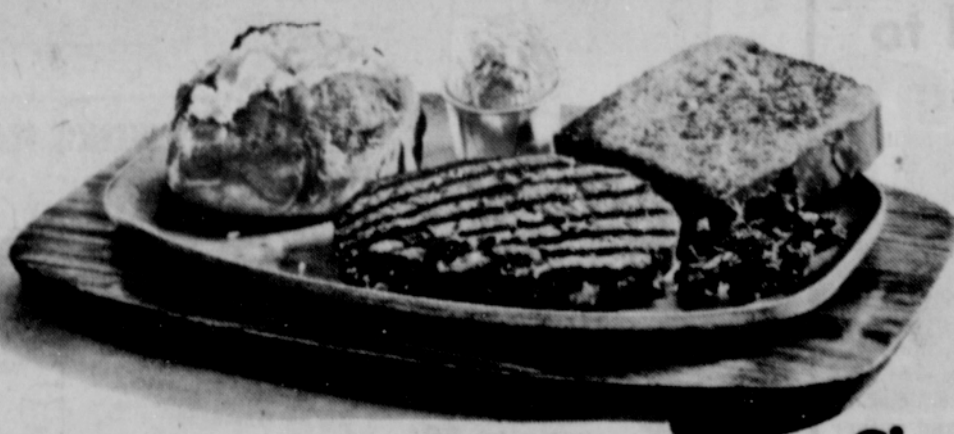
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
