Sandy Union High School football players have two more evenings of preseason conditioning before regular practice gets under way Monday at the school. "We have two drills a day,"

Cottrell Grade news

Cottrell school's fall term will begin Tuesday, Sept. 2, at 9 a.m. and will dismiss at noon. The buses will run the same routes as they did last year and at the same times. Hot lunches will be served starting Wednesday, Sept. 3, with students paying 40 cents, adults and teachers paying 75 cents for lunches daily. Milk will be available at 5 cents a half-pint. Free and reduced-price lunches will be offered for all children who are unable to pay the full cost of lunches. Parents will be receiving a full explanation of this lunch program

as determined by the State Department of Education and the National School Lunch Program. An application for the reduced-priced and free lunches is enclosed with information sheet now being sent in the mail and parents are encouraged to complete and return the applications to the school office. All information regarding free and reduced-price lunches will be considered confidential and used only to determine eligibility for these lunches. School supply lists for all grades are enclosed with the

lunch information sheets and are being mailed to all registered students. Students new to the Cottrell School district may register at the school office any week day from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and pick up all information sheets. All first-graders and students entering Cottrell this year from out-of-state are required by law to present immunization records when enrolling in school.
