Boring School to open Sept. 2

Boring Elementary School has announced its schedule for the 1975-76 school year. School will open Sept. 2. Students will be dismissed at 11:30 a.m. the first day. New students should register Aug. 26. Registration is from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The district will have professional day Oct. 10 so there will be no school. The first nine weeks will end Oct. 31 with parent conferences Nov. 4 and 5.

There will be no school on Veterans Day Nov. 11 and Christmas vacation will be Dec. 20 to Jan. 4. School resumes Jan. 5 with the end of the first semester Jan. 16. Spring vacation will be March 22 to 26 with the last day of school May 28. The Boring school board meets at 8 p.m. the second Tuesday of each month in the Naas Elementary Building library. Telephone rate information meeting set

Informal public information meetings on Continental Telephone Company's request for a \$690,000 increase in annual revenues have been set for next week by Public Utility Commissioner Charles Davis. The meetings are part of the PUC staff investigation of the company's request which would increase the monthly charge for residential service by 49 per cent. Also included in the request are increases in

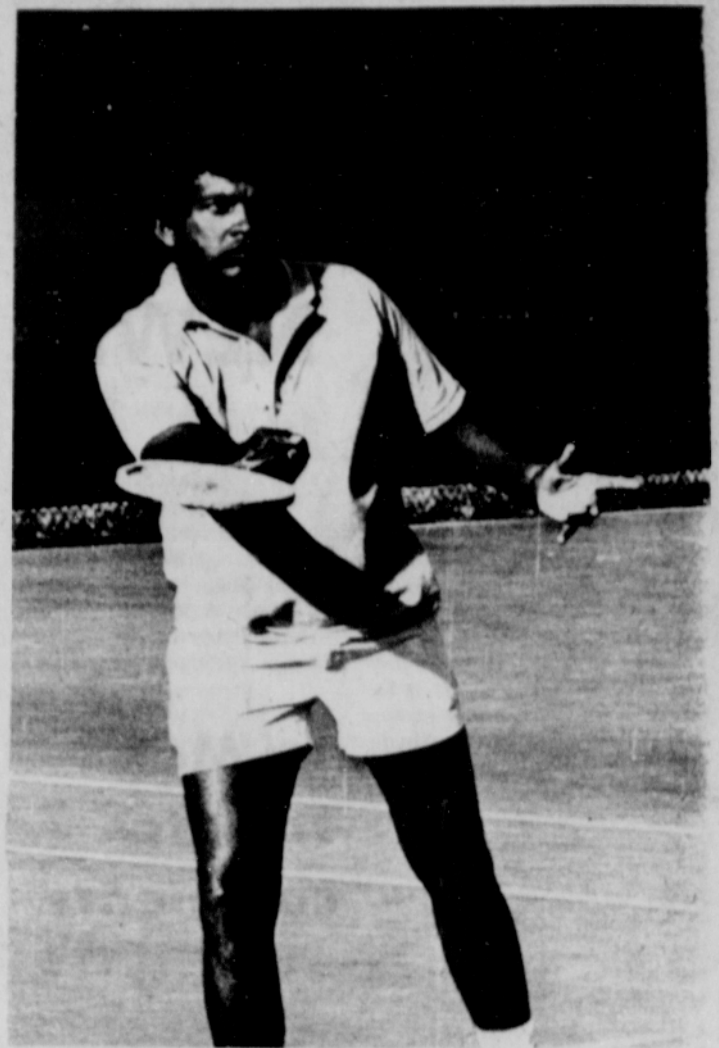

mission assumed when we were looking for a deputy we were looking for a man," Thomas said. One phase of the criteria—a physical agility test—is being restructured. Few women were able to pass the test, which included jumping over a six foot wall, he said. "The new test will probably include some physical requirements like the ability to drag so much weight for so many feet," Thomas said. "For example, that might be necessary in an auto accident

when the car is on fire and the person is in extreme danger." There are no females among the 43 patrolmen, 6 of them recruits, but Thomas said there are 5 female women matrons at the jail who get the same pay as the 13 male jailers. About 35 per cent of the department are female but most of them are in clerical jobs. Clackamas County came under federal scrutiny after an anonymous complaint, alleged sex discrimination.

Written comments due on Tri-Met proposals

Aug. 26 is the key date for written comment on Tri-Met's financing proposals, Tri-Met's General Manager notes.

The proposal presented to the Tri-Met board Aug. 4 by General Manager Tom King, include a five-cent fare increase beginning July, 1976; submitting a \$5 annual auto license fee to Tri-County voters in May; a temporary .1 per cent increase in the payroll tax pending outcome of that election; and sale of advertising inside the buses.

Comments from interested individuals and groups were heard by the board at the time of the initial presentation, King notes, but the board will also consider written comments from those who were unable to attend the August meeting.

The Aug. 26 deadline, one week in advance of board action on the financing plan, allows time to get written material copied and distributed to Board members so they can read it before their Sept 2 meeting. Statements may also be made in person Sept. 2. "Listening to citizens and responding to their concerns is the first duty of a public agency," King said. "The only way we can be sure we have an acceptable financing program

is for Tri-County people to speak up." King noted the financing proposals were developed after a series of seven public hearings last spring brought strong consensus that Tri-Met should continue and improve present levels of service, even if that required additional taxes, rather than cut back service to keep costs within existing revenues.

Republicans to meet

A meeting of the Clackamas County Republican Central Committee will be held Wednesday, Aug. 27, at 7:30 p.m. in Judge Bradshaw's court room in the court-house at Oregon City.

This is the first meeting of the committee since the elections of Chairman David Cargo and vice-chairman Ginnie Rosebrock, and is called for the purpose of hearing reports of the standing committee chairmen, voting on a proposed revision of the State Central Committee constitution, and for outlining plans for precinct organization and assistance to prospective candidates.
