

Sheriff gets money for staff

Money from the federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act will allow the Clackamas County Sheriff's department to hire 15 new employees.

Authority to hire the people was given by the board of commissioners Thursday, Aug. 14, although some commissioners criticized sheriff's officials for making statements that budget problems would require laying off some department employees.

"This propaganda has got to

cease. It's a disgrace," board chairman Tom Telford said. He said top officials of the sheriff's department have been telling residents that because of staff cuts by the county commissioners there would be delays in responding to calls for assistance.

The new positions, plus eight jobs already funded by funds from the employment and training act, will mean that 23 members of the sheriff's department have all or part of their salaries paid by federal

funds. About \$250,000 in federal funds will be used to pay the salaries for those positions through June of next year, according to Dell Smith, county Manpower director.

Robbers hit tavern

Two armed robbers made off with about \$800 in a robbery of the Whistle Stop Tavern and its patrons Sunday night.

The suspects, described by victims as being in their 20s, were wearing sunglasses, dark clothes and dark shoes.

One victim reported that the robbers came in a rear door with sawed-off shotguns and herded the customers into a corner. One customer was ordered to tape up the mouths and wrists of each person in the tavern. Then everyone was ordered to lay down on the floor.

Vicki Austin, 28, cook at the

tavern was ordered to open the cash box, and when unable to do so was slapped a few times by one of the robbers, according to one witness.

Bartender Robert Hoak, 26, then opened the register and the two suspects took its contents. Wallets of all persons in the tavern were collected and the robbers removed all cash from them. Credit cards, checks and identification papers were ignored by the robbers.

No one reported hearing or seeing a car leave the area.

Hoak reported that the robbers were in the tavern for about 10 minutes and said little to anyone.

Police are still looking for the two men.
