Hamburger specials

After the ham and turkey of the holiday season we look forward to having the good old American standby hamburger again. Here's a different and attractive way to serve it.

Hamburgers Hawaiian
Combine: two-third cup milk, 1½ lbs. hamburger, ½ cup chopped onion, two-third cup cracker crumbs, 1 teaspoon seasoned salt. Form into hamburger patties or meatballs. Brown the meat and cover with sauce. Simmer over low heat about 15 minutes.

SAUCE: Drain 1 can (13½ oz.) pineapple chunks. Combine syrup and water to equal 1 cup. Add 2 tablespoons cornstarch, ¼ cup vinegar, ¼ cup brown sugar, and 2 tablespoons soy sauce. Heat in pan until thickened and clear. Add pineapple chunks and 1 cup coarsely chopped green pepper.

Serve Hamburgers Hawaiian with rice. When meatballs are cooked in an electric frying pan this makes a good dish to carry to a potluck supper. It looks pretty and tastes good. Serves 6.—From the files of Ms. Betty Monroe, Honolulu, Hawaii.

Oriental Casserole
2 tablespoons margarine
2 tablespoons flour
1½ cups milk
1 pkg. (8 oz.) sharp cheddar cheese (shredded)
1 teaspoon soy sauce
½ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
2 cups cooked rice
2 cups diced cooked chicken
1 can (3 oz.) sliced mushrooms, drained
1 can (8 oz.) water chestnuts, drained and sliced
1 can (3 oz.) chow mein noodles

Make cream sauce with the margarine, flour and milk. Add the cheese and seasonings. Stir until cheese is melted. Combine rice, chicken, mushrooms and water chestnuts. Place alternate layers of chicken-rice mixture and sauce in 1½ qt. casserole. Bake in 350 degree oven for 25 minutes. Serves 6.—From the files of Mrs. Helen O'Harrow, Sandy. Paprika Potatoes
Peel potatoes and cut into golfball-sized chunks. Dip into melted butter and roll into mixture below:
One-third cup flour
1 teaspoon paprika
1½ teaspoons salt

Bran Muffins
(This recipe may be cut in half)
2 cups Bran Buds
2 cups boiling water
3 cups sugar
1½ cups margarine
4 eggs
1 quart buttermilk
5 cups flour
5 teaspoons soda
1 tablespoon salt
4 cups All Bran

For those of us who are always looking for new and easy ways to fix potatoes, here are two dandy recipes.

Skillet Scalloped Potatoes
(quicker than the oven and they never curdle)
6 medium size potatoes
4 tablespoons shortening or bacon grease
1 medium onion
1 teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
One-third cup light cream (or whole milk)
½ cup grated cheddar cheese

Peel potatoes and onion, slice thinly. Melt shortening in large skillet. Add potatoes, onion and seasonings. Fry slowly over medium heat until golden brown, turning often. Pour on cream, add cheese, stirring gently to mix. Cover, cook slowly 10 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Serves 6.—From the files of Mrs. Carol Stankewitsch, Sandy.
