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Levy considered

increases in tuition and fees and reduction of activities and athletics programs, custodial and grounds services, repair and replacement of equipment and general services, as well as other cost saving steps.

Klapstein stressed that proposed cuts were not policy, but a general direction to be gelled over the next few months.

Board Chairman Malcom MacGregor explained, "We're not trying to threaten anyone with a long list of class deletions, but we have to plan ahead to give students and staff advance warning of what may happen in the future."

"At this time," assistant to the president Roger McDowell noted, "we're concentrating on cutting courses rather than programs."

Board members suggested the adverse vote probably did not reflect disenchantment with the college, but rather indicated fear of rising taxes in general. Alternate means of raising school funds other than through property taxes should be sought, members proposed.
