Mishima files for MHCC post

Eulia Mishima's concern for quality education led her to apply for the Zone 2 position on Mt. Hood Community College Board of Directors.

"I haven't been active or well acquainted with school board activities until I decided to run the afternoon of the deadline," Mrs. Mishima admitted. "Since then, I've been busy learning. Running for school board is a whole new experience."

Mrs. Mishima believes her experience as a student will be an asset to the MHCC board. She has spent 16 years attending college.

"I've had the opportunity to compare students over the years (and) to compare three different administrative approaches."

Mrs. Mishima fit her schooling in between children, attending Portland State University, Portland Museum Art School and Reed College over the years. She received a Bachelor of Fine Arts in 1971 and a Master of Arts in Teaching in 1972.

"Work, family, span of time and recent liberal schooling have given me a keen

awareness of young students needs. The total experience has also allowed me to evaluate honestly learning processes, students, instructors, administrators and educational policies.

"Students are more sophisticated today," she noted. "Many are disenchanted and lonely, but they're still interested in doing good things."

A well-run community college, she believes, will create an atmosphere that makes school meaningful to each student.

"It's a good place for young and old to exchange ideas—to bridge the generation gap," she said.

Not only administrators and teachers, but also students and members of the community, she believes, should have their opinions taken seriously.

"Mt. Hood is currently looking for a new president. That is the primary reason I would like to serve on the board at this time—to participate in that selection. A new president will be setting the standards for the college for many years to come."
