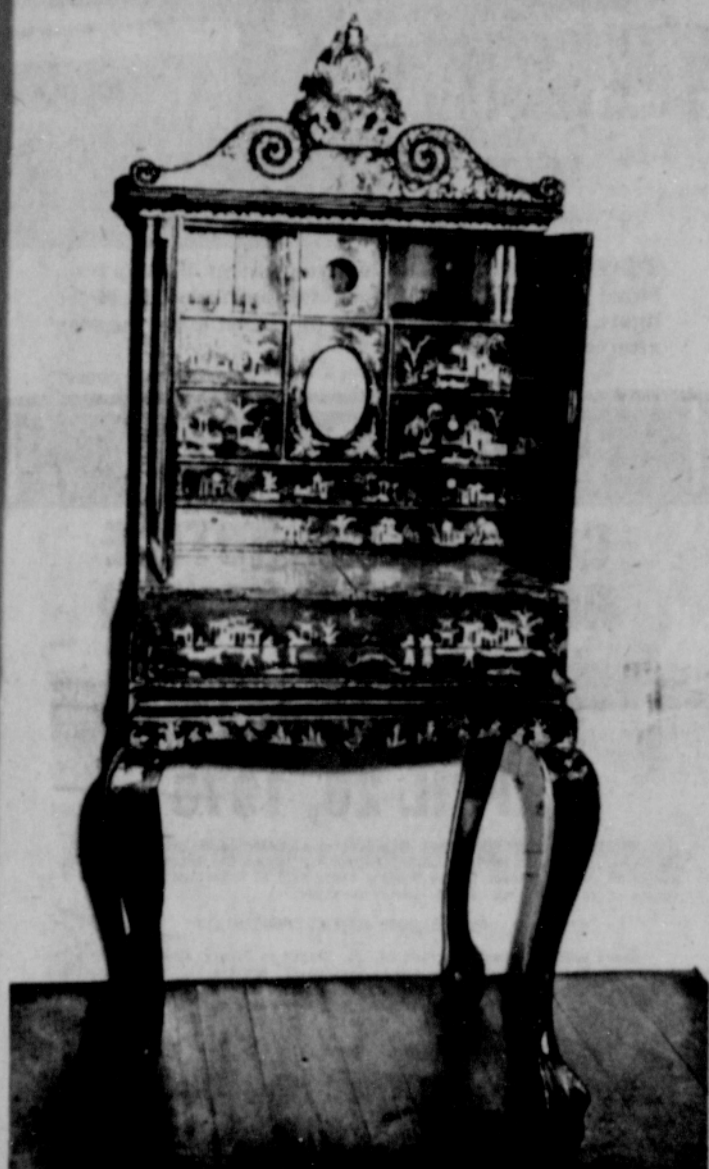




BROUGHT TO Oregon in 1851, this piano was presented to the McLoughlin Memorial Association in 1920.

Nutrition lessons on television show

The kids in "Mulligan Stew" sing a song about "4-4-3-2, that's the magic formula for me and you."

The "magic formula" is the number of servings needed each day from the four basic food groups for a balanced diet, points out John Mellott, Multnomah County extension agent.

That's just one of the nutrition lessons stressed in "Mulligan Stew," a six part television series which is being used in classrooms throughout Oregon as part of a nutrition education effort sponsored by the Oregon State University Extension Service, Oregon Educational and Public Broadcasting Service and the State Department of Education.

And "Mulligan Stew" is just about to start its third run this year on KOAP-TV, Channel 10, adds William Wikenwerder, OSU Extension youth specialist.

Each of the six programs is shown three times each week at 10 a.m. Monday, 1:30 p.m. Wednesday and 11 a.m. Friday. The series will begin Monday, April 5, as part of the "in-school" broadcasting schedule of OEPBS.

Although the programs are designed to teach basic nutrition lessons to grade school students, parents and other young people can learn from "Mulligan Stew," Mellott stresses.

The program has proved to be popular with Oregon teachers, Wikenwerder adds, ranking first in the number of viewers of in-school programming over the public TV stations last year.

Veterinary course offered

Mt. Hood Community College's community service program has scheduled a six-week class beginning April 7, titled, "Basic Veterinary Management of Domestic Animals."

Gresham veterinarian Dr. Jarvis Williams is the instructor for the Wednesday evening course. The class is scheduled for 7 to 10 p.m. in room SC 119 and is open to all interested persons high school age or older.

Dr. Williams said the course is designed for people like farmers, dairymen, 4-H leaders, and domestic animal owners and breeders. Modern management techniques and skills, basic veterinary care, nutrition, health and disease information, restraint, vaccinations and other subjects will be covered. The weekly emphasis will be placed on horses, sheep and goats, swine, cattle, exotic pets, and particular interest.

Bishop Lyal Zaugg of the Sandy Ward Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints invites the public to view a general conference being broadcast from Tabernacle Square of Salt Lake City this Sunday on channel 2 at 8 a.m.

Mr. and Mrs. Hal McBride, first counselor of the Sandy Ward will be attending the conference.

The conference, April 3, 4 and 6, in Salt Lake City, will feature the music of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir under the direction of Dr. Jerold D. Ottley. The 375-voice choir has won world fame through its tours, record albums and its weekly radio and television program, "Music and the Spoken Word," now in its fifth decade.

President Spencer W. Kimball, world leader of the 3.5 million member church, will preside over the conference. Speakers will include, in addition to President Kimball, members of the First Presidency, N. Eldon Tanner and Marion G. Romney, as well as other top authorities of the church. The family, moral living, service to others, loyalty, and the life of Jesus Christ are some of the topics on which speakers will concentrate as they offer ways to meet the world's challenges.

World Conferences are held twice each year, during the first week in April and in October. Beginning in April of 1980, conferences have been held to bring the body of Church membership together to receive counsel and instruction from Church leaders.

While thousands will attend the conference in person in Salt Lake City, many thousands more will "attend" in their own homes through radio and television broadcasts. Over 350 radio and television stations will broadcast sessions to the United States, Canada, Mexico, Central America, Japan, Europe, Africa, Australia and the Pacific.

School appeal planned
