However, the action didn't come until after a long discussion concerning involvement participation by an MHCC club in a national event. Nor was the action unanimous, with board member JoAnn Connell voting against the policy and Alice Thompson abstaining.

During its early years, MHCC athletes competed in national events. Subsequently, the school changed leagues and in its new affiliation, limited competition to local, state and regional events (Oregon and Washington). Sufficient funds were not available to send MHCC teams outside the area.
