Government Camp Sanitary District Bond Sale

NOTICE OF BOND SALE

1976 REVENUE BONDS

Notice is hereby given that sealed written bids will be received on behalf of the Government Camp Sanitary District, by its Board of Directors as its governing body, at the Cascade Ski Club Building in Government Camp, Oregon, on May 24, 1976 until 7:30 p.m. P.S.T. for the purchase of \$225,000 principal amount of bonds of the District designated "Government Camp Sanitary District, Clackamas County, Oregon, 1976 Revenue Bonds" as more specifically described below. The bonds were authorized at an election held by the registered voters of the District on May 6, 1975.

ISSUE: \$225,000 consisting of 31 coupon bonds in the denomination of \$5,000 and 70 coupon bonds in the denomination of \$1,000, all dated April 1, 1976 and comprising all of the bonds of the authorized issue.

INTEREST RATE: Maximum not to exceed a net effective rate of 8 percent per annum, the first interest payment due on October 1, 1976 and semi-annually thereafter on October 1 and April of each year.

Bidders must specify the interest rate or rates which the bonds hereby offered for sale shall bear. The bids shall comply with the following conditions: (1) each interest rate specified in any bid must be in multiples of 1/20th of 1 percent, not exceeding a net effective rate of 8 percent per annum; (2) no bond shall bear more than one rate of interest, no interest payment shall be evidenced by more than one coupon, and supplemental coupons will not be permitted; (3) each bond shall bear interest from its date to its stated maturity date at the interest rate specified in the bids; (4) all bonds maturing at any one time shall bear the same rate of interest.

MATURITIES: The bonds shall mature serially as follows:

REDEMPTION: All or any of the bonds may be called on any interest date and redeemed on that interest date at par at the option of the Board of Directors of the District, plus payment of accrued interest to the date of redemption and any or all of the bonds subject to call may be called for redemption at any one time and if less than all of the bonds are redeemed at any one time, those bonds shall be redeemed in inverse order of maturity and by lot within a maturity.

SUBSEQUENT REVENUE BONDS: The District may, from time to time prior to the maturity or redemption of all of the bonds hereby authorized for sale, issue additional Revenue Bonds of the District, the payment of which may be pledged to the revenues of the District from the same sources as are pledged the revenues for payment of the principal and interest on these bonds, such revenues which might be pledged for such additional bonds be on a parity with the revenues of the District which are pledged for the payment of the bonds hereby authorized for sale.

PAYMENT: Both principal and interest are payable in lawful money of the United States in the office of the Clackamas County Treasurer, Oregon City, Clackamas County, State of Oregon.

PURPOSE: The bonds were authorized for the purpose of funding construction of an expansion and upgrading of the existing sewerage treatment plant and construction of additional collection sewer lines to serve the Government Camp Sanitary District.

SECURITY: The bonds are unsecured. The revenues of the District derived from sewer users' service charges, connection fees and such other revenues as the Board of Directors of the District shall, from time to time, determine are pledged for the payment of the principal and interest due on said bonds.

LEGAL OPINION: The unqualified written legal opinion of the law firm of Rankin, Ragen, Roberts, Benson and Gallagher of Portland, Oregon, approving the validity of the bonds shall be furnished to the successful bidder without cost. A copy of the legal opinion, to be certified by the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the District, will be provided on each bond at the expense of the District.

TAX EXEMPT STATUS: Interest on the bonds in the opinion of the bond journal is exempt from taxation by the United States

under present federal income tax laws and from personal income taxation by the State of Oregon under present state law.

BOND PURCHASE AGREEMENT: The Government Camp Sanitary District has entered into a bond purchase agreement with the Department of Environmental Quality of the State of Oregon wherein the Department of Environmental Quality has agreed to submit a bid for purchase of the revenue bonds at interest rates determined by said agreement and wherein the District has agreed to sell those bonds to the Department of Environmental Quality if it shall be determined to be the highest bidder.

TERMS OF SALE

HIGHEST BID: The bonds will be awarded to the highest responsible bidder considering the interest rate or rates specified. The highest bid will be determined by computing the total amount of interest which the District would be required to pay from the date of each bond to its respective maturity date at the coupon rate or rates specified in the bid assuming no bonds are called prior to maturity, and the award will be made on the basis of the lowest net effective interest rate to the District. The purchaser may pay accrued interest, computed on a 360-day basis, from the date of the bonds to the date of delivery. The cost of printing the bonds will be borne by the District.

RIGHT OF REJECTION: The District will take action awarding the bonds or rejecting all of the bids at its meeting of the District's Board of Directors at 7:30 o'clock p.m. P.S.T., May 24, 1976, but in any event not later than 4 hours after the expiration of the time herein prescribed for the receipt of proposals, unless such time of award is waived by the successful bidder.

DELIVERY: Delivery of the bonds shall be made to the successful bidder without cost to the successful bidder at such location, in the City of Portland, Oregon, as the successful bidder shall name, or elsewhere in the United States at the expense of the purchaser. Payment for the bonds shall be made in immediately available funds. Delivery will be made as soon as the bonds can be prepared, which is estimated will be within 30 days from the date of sale.

RIGHT OF CANCELLATION: The successful bidder shall have the right, at his option, to cancel the contract of purchase if the District shall fail to execute the bonds and tender the same for delivery within 60 days from the date of sale thereon and in such event the successful bidder shall be entitled to the return of the deposit accompanying his bid.

FORM OF BID: All bids must be for not less than all the bonds hereby offered for sale, and for not less than one hundred percent (100%) of the par value thereof and accrued interest to the date of delivery. Each bid together with bidder's check as herein specified must be enclosed in a sealed envelope addressed to the Board of Directors, Government Camp Sanitary District, Government Camp, Oregon and designated "Bid for Government Camp Sanitary District, 1976 Revenue Bonds." Bids must be received by 7:30 p.m. Pacific Standard Time at the Cascade Ski Club Building in Government Camp, Oregon on May 24, 1976; bids may be mailed to the District, in care of its Secretary, P.O. Box 12, Government Camp, Oregon 97028.

BID CHECK: All bids must be unconditional and accompanied by a certified or cashier's check on a bank doing business in the State of Oregon for \$4,500 payable to the order of the Government Camp Sanitary District, to secure the District from any loss resulting from the failure of the bidders to comply with the terms of its bid. In addition, bidders are requested to supply an estimate of the total interest costs and net effective interest rate, based upon the aggregate interest cost, if its bid be accepted, that the District will pay upon the issue if the bid is accepted. Such information shall be considered as informative only and not binding either on the bidder or the District. Checks will be forfeited to the District as liquidated damages in case the bidder to whom the bonds are awarded shall withdraw its bid or fail to complete its purchase in accordance with the terms thereof. No interest shall be allowed on the deposit but the check of the successful bidder will be retained as part payment of the bonds or for liquidated damages as described above. Check of the unsuccessful bidders will be returned by the District by mail promptly after May 24, 1976.

NO LITIGATION CERTIFICATE: At the time of payment for the delivery of said bonds, the District will furnish the successful bidder a certificate that there is no litigation pending affecting the validity of the bonds.
