

## Secretary of state race draws seven

Two Republicans and five Democrats are entered in the May 25 primary for secretary of state.

Republicans John Kelting and Norma Paulus face off while the candidates for the Democratic nomination are Al Denmore, Dick Groener, Phil McAlmond, Blaine Whipple and Caroline Wilkins.

John Kelting is a self-employed general contractor from Tigard. He attended both Portland State University and Portland Community College and has been active in Tigard civic, school board and political activities.

Kelting has been a campaign assistant for local, state and national candidates in Oregon, Florida and California. He was a member of the Fresno County (Calif.) and Republican Central Committee, a Fresno County campaign assistant for the 1960 GOP Presidential election, and campaign chairman of the Goldwater for President Committee in Coalinga, Calif.

Running opposite Kelting is Salem Republican Norma Paulus. A representative to the Oregon State Legislature since 1971, Paulus is a member of five committees relating to land use, timber and natural resources. She also helped draft the Open Meeting, Conflict of Interest and Lobby Disclosure laws.

Paulus is a graduate of

Willamette University Law School and has been self-employed as a lawyer since 1962. She is in favor of a uniform accounting system for all state agencies, would require agency financial statements to correspond with budget periods, and is a sponsor of an initiative to allow Oregon Independents to vote in the primary.

On the Democratic side, Al Denmore is the only statewide candidate seeking elected office to be placed on the ballot by petition. A Medford school teacher since 1968, Denmore is a three-term member of the Oregon House of Representatives. He was Speaker Pro Tem in 1975, House Assistant Majority Leader in 1973, and has served as chairman of the Elections, Energy, and Local Government-Urban Affairs committees.

A graduate of Reynolds High School, Portland State University and Southern Oregon State College, Denmore supports specific life spans for all state agencies, is in favor of performance audits for state agencies to compare goals and guidelines with actual performance and thinks all statewide candidates would be required to file by petition.

Dick Groener, President Pro Tem of the Oregon Senate, has served in the Oregon legislature for 18 years. He has either chaired or been a

member of virtually every standing committee in both the House and Senate.

Groener lives in Oak Grove and is a partner in a general insurance agency.

The senator says he stresses teamwork in the legislature as the best approach to Oregon's problems. He supports the present auditing system but calls for greater enforcement of its procedures. He also supports the state's primary system.

Groener supports a better balance between industry and environmental protection. He is against smokestacks but the delays even clean industry faces are harmful to the economy and contributes to unemployment.

Phil McAlmond is running for secretary of state on the strength of twenty years of business, political and ad-

ministrative activities. He supports efficient auditing procedures and sane planning in the use of Oregon's natural resources.

Blaine Whipple is a state senator and the president of his own corporation. He is chairman of the Senate Task Force on Public Employee's Retirement, is chairman of the legislature subcommittee on state government operations studying the audit of state agencies, and last session was vice-chairman of the Local Government and Elections Committee.

Whipple, a graduate of both the University of Oregon and the University of Minnesota, supports greater circulation of details on new legislation to those affected, recommends a performance audit, and is in favor of the people electing the delegates to national con-

ventions. Caroline Wilkins is the executive vice-chairman of the Democratic National Committee and former state chairman of the Democratic Party of Oregon. She was the nation's only woman Democratic state leader when she was elected in 1969.

Wilkins has taught history at Oregon State University and is a former member of the Oregon Government Ethics Commission. She believes state auditing should measure the service people are getting for their tax dollars and it should insure that the intent of the law is being served.

She also sees a greater role for the secretary of state in promoting voter turnout, through improved registration procedures and issuing effective information about the candidates.
