Forest inventory planned

A timber inventory will be conducted this summer of forest lands in Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington counties by the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment station, U.S. Forest Service, Portland. Work will continue through September to measure timber on all lands except those managed by the National Forest System and Bureau of

Land Management. This three-county inventory is part of the nationwide forest survey authorized by the McSweeney-McNary Forest Research act of 1928. Purpose of the inventory is to provide information on current and future timber supplies. Information from the inventory will be combined with similar data from national forest and Bureau of Land Management

lands to provide statistics on the total timber resources of each county. At the time the last inventory in 1961, the three counties were estimated to contain 5,972 million cubic feet of softwood and hardwood timber. The total area of commercial forest land in the three counties is 1,328,000 acres. The inventory will provide up-to-date information for evaluating the changes oc-

curing in the timber resource of three counties and for assessing the probable level of future timber supplies, according to Charles Van Sickle, project leader. The inventory will also attempt to determine the relationships to timber production of increased emphasis on scenic, recreation and watershed values during the past few years.

Fieldwork will be done by experiment station employees with experience in timber survey and by student summer employes under the direction of foresters Hal Arbogast, Dale Baer, J.D. Lloyd and Bruce Hiserote. The survey crew will relocate and collect data on 174 one-acre plots in the three-county area.

Garden club meets

The Sandy Garden club held its May meeting at the Sandy Assembly of God church May 5. Mrs. A. H. Mason, past state president of the Oregon State Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc., spoke on "Dahlia Culture." Each life membership was donated by the Sandy Garden club. Proceeds from life membership sales to the Claire Hanley Scholarship fund for students enrolled in hor-

ticulture or related subject. It was announced that the club will hold a flower show in the Odd Fellows Hall on June 5. The theme will be "America the Beautiful."

EXPLANATION OF THE BALLOT QUESTION: The proposed tax base has been designed to implement a 5 year Comprehensive Plan prepared for the District by a Committee of 25 of its residents. The Board of Directors believes that a \$210,000.00 tax base is the best method of implementing the programs approved by the Committee. The Plan emphasizes programs that will enable the District to maintain and improve the system of providing firefighting and first aid protection, by continuing to depend primarily on the Volunteer Firefighters. The Plan also makes provision for the hiring of one additional paid firefighter, over its 5 year life, to supplement the Volunteers during the day time hours. The proposed tax base will help enable District residents to maintain their present insurance rates. The existing tax base was approved when the District was formed in 1961. The present District operating budget is \$149,000.00.			YES 206
