MHCC graduation Sunday

Another academic year is drawing to a close this weekend with graduation ceremonies scheduled for Sunday afternoon at 2:30 in the college gym. About 600 students will cross the temporary stage to receive two-year degrees and one-year certificates. Students David Sterns and Dan Henry are the afternoon's scheduled speakers and will address themselves to the theme "MHCC's Salute to our American Heritage." The concert orchestra and choir will perform and student Michael Richins will give the invocation and Mark Yeager will give the benediction. Graduation exercises are open to the public and community residents are welcome to the ninth annual ceremony.

Twenty-five members of the Community Band attended last Wednesday's Board of Education meeting to request that the elimination of the

programs be reconsidered. The band, comprised of about 50 area residents, has been practicing weekly in the creative arts area and performed at several gatherings this year. Mike Off, speaker for the band, stated that they would provide their own funding if the college could just provide the facility for practicing. The board members agreed. The band sponsorship was one of the community service programs scheduled for elimination because of budget

cuts planned for next year.

Forty-eight students were honored during an informal reception Wednesday for their achievement of being placed on the national roll of "Who's Who in American Junior Colleges." Eligibility for the honor is that a student must be graduating this year and have 72 credit hours or more with a grade point average of three point (B), or better. MHCC faculty members recommended those students to be recognized.

Rebekah delegates attend conclave

May 27 was the regular meeting of Sandy Rebekah Lodge No. 193 with Wilma McLean, vice grand, presiding in the absence of Viola Simmons, noble grand, who is recuperating from recent surgery.

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OSU graduation date nears

Between 3,500 and 3,600 degrees will be conferred this Sunday at Oregon State University's 107th commencement.

Local students who are candidates for degrees include Curtis M. Meier, Larry Thompson, James Moore and Nancy Parker, all of Boring; and Sandy residents Thomas Benshoof, Timothy Benshoof, George Denhart and Susan Arndt.

The graduation program is scheduled at 2 p.m. in Gill Coliseum. Ticket-holding families and friends of graduates will fill the giant building but television coverage will permit thousands of others to watch.

Both KOAC-TV, Channel 7, Corvallis, and KOAP-TV, Channel 10, Portland, will provide color coverage.

The number of degrees conferred will be an all-time high for the university. The previous record was the 3,498 degrees awarded in 1973. The number dropped to 3,480 in 1974 and to 3,400 last year when the total number of degrees awarded by OSU over the past 106 years passed the 75,000 mark.

Following OSU tradition, there will be no commencement speaker, but President Robert MacVicar will make an address following the conferring of degrees.

What's cooking

Tangy spring chicken featured

Tangy Spring Chicken

- 1 broiler-frying chicken, cut in serving pieces
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 bottle (12 oz.) chili sauce
- 1 jar (10 oz.) grape jelly
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
- One-third cup slivered almonds

Heat oil in skillet; add chicken and saute lightly for about 10 minutes on each side.

Transfer chicken to a shallow baking dish. Sprinkle with salt. Drain excess fat from skillet; pour chili sauce and jelly, then add Worcestershire sauce and garlic salt. Heat until jelly melts, about 5 minutes.

Pour sauce over chicken. Cover baking dish and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Remove cover, sprinkle almonds over chicken and bake for 30 minutes longer.

Serve chicken and sauce over hot rice.

A very pretty dessert to serve for a company dinner at this time of the year is Danish Strawberry Pie.

Danish Strawberry Pie

- Bake a 9-in. pie crust.
- Slice one box of fresh ripe strawberries and put about 2 tablespoons of sugar over them. Well drained frozen berries may also be used.
- Prepare one box of Strawberry Junket Danish Dessert Pie Filling according to directions for pie filling. Allow to cool slightly and add

strawberries. When thoroughly cooled put into pie crust and refrigerate for 4 hours.

Just before serving you may squirt a circle of Real Cream Topping around the edge of the pie if desired.

The raspberry Danish dessert and frozen or fresh raspberries also make a delicious pie.

Sweetheart Mints

- 5 tablespoons margarine
- 4 drops food coloring (green is very pretty)
- 1 teaspoon spearmint or peppermint extract
- 1 pound (4 cups) powdered sugar, unsifted
- 2 tablespoons cold water
- Melt margarine in saucepan. Add coloring and extract. Stir to blend. Stir in powdered sugar and water. Knead in pan and then on board until smooth.
- Roll out on waxed paper to about 1/4 inch thickness and cut with cookie cutters, or make

into small balls and flatten with a glass or fork or other shapes one may find in the kitchen.

If you flatten small balls, ridge them with a fork. Trimmings may be kneaded and rolled again.

After shaping, place on cake racks for several hours. (2), to dry. Store in air tight containers. Some may be frozen.

Whimsical farce at MHCC

"The Skin of Our Teeth," a whimsical farce based on the survival of the human race, will be presented at Mt. Hood Community College June 4 and 5.

The play was first presented on Broadway in 1942.

According to director and MHCC theater arts instructor Dave Spooner, "The Play has gained critical acclaim around the world for its profound but optimistic insight into the challenge of man's everyday existence."

The play, by Thornton Wilder, is about an allegorical family that survives the ice age, the great flood and the terror of world war with their simple positive values still intact.

The role of Sabina, beauty queen, camp follower and maid to the Antrobus family will be portrayed by Chris Bjore, Mr. and Mrs. Antrobus are played by Dennis Proulx and Laura Stacy. Ernie Smyth and Greg

Richkind will appear as the Antrobus children, Gladys and Henry.

A cast of approximately 20 persons will appear as refugees, conveners, animals and back stage personnel who come on stage to momentarily interrupt the play within the play with bits of theatrical farce.

School board adopts calendar

The Welches School Board adopted a district calendar for the 1976-77 school year at their meeting.

The calendar schedule calls for teacher in-service days Sept. 1 and 2 with students reporting back to school Sept. 7 after Labor Day. Christmas vacation will start Dec. 23 and spring vacation next year will begin March 21. The last day of school in 1977 will be June 9.

At the meeting, members of the board also discussed a proposed emergency transportation policy in the event of an accident and a primary reading program. No action was taken on these proposals.

The board also held discussion on the suggested qualifications for the superintendent-principal who will be appointed for the district in June.



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
