Mountain Players to hold work party tonight at Wemme Lion's hall

COME TO the Lion's Club tonight for a pot luck dinner and work party to get ready for the two plays that are now in rehearsal.

We need some strong men to help with the storage area. And bring your paint roller and roller tray to give the scenery a new coat of paint.

The next meeting of the Mountain Players will be at the Lion's Club... with a meeting first and happy hour later.

DAVE AND SUE ENNA have planned a group art show and open house for the Fourth of July weekend. They will have 11 different art forms represented.

Those in the show include: ROSEMARY FOGGIA JONES, leather etchings; DOROTHY HAGERTY, impressionistic oils; GARY LAWRENCE, metal sculpture; TIM AND GAIL O'NEILL, stained glass; JIM ROGERS, sculpture; SEWARD ROTH, watercolors; GERMAINE ROWE, hookings; LANCE SCHELVAN, photo studies; JOHN SUTTER, wood burning; and BUZ WILLIAMS AND ERIC BERLIN, glass blowing.

Children are welcome and they will have a children's clay play room. The group show and open house will be at the Ennas' home and sorkshop on Sandy Ave. off Truman Road on Friday, July 2 from 4 - 8 p.m. and July 3-4 from 12 - 6 p.m.

They will take everything out of their house and use all of the walls and table space to display the work of the featured artists... all personal friends of the Ennas'.

SUE AND DAVE met in

England about ten years ago. Dave was in the service and Sue studying pottery. They both apprenticed with a potter there learning the techniques of production pottery. Returning here in 1971, they set up a studio and shop in Gresham.

ABOUT TWO AND a half years ago they moved to the mountain and built their home in a lovely wooded setting with a separate building for a studio.

It's a split level design with the center level for the finished ware... up a few steps to the area where Dave throws the plates, cups, goblets, canisters and caseroles on the potter's wheel.

Down a few steps is the glaze department managed by Sue. Here she mixes the glaze formulas for about a dozen different glazes. Each of the ingredients are carefully weighed, mixed with water and put in 50 gallon containers.

The bisqued pieces are dipped in the glaze and then stacked for firing in the propane kiln outside a sliding door. The space inside is about 30-square-feet with several layers of pots stacked inside and fired daily.

Dave and Sue are constantly experimenting with new forms and glazes to add variety to their work. They put in a ten hour day with maybe a little more leisure on the weekend. In February they took a three week vacation and visited England. It was great for them to see their friends there and visit studios of other potters... and exchange ideas.

Ennas' supply three restaurants in the Portland area with their dinnerware and wholesale to three shops. Some of the designs are slab con-

struction with a wheel thrown top and lid... square, octagonal, oblong. Lamps are one of their newer creations. Dave uses 3,000 pounds of clay a month.

ELLEN AND ANDREA OLSEN are going to Grenoble, France this summer on a Teen Missions Inc. project. One thousand teenage youngsters will be going to missions all over the world this summer through the program.

Boot camp will be in Florida to learn to lay brick and mix mortar. When the unit of 30 that the Olsen girls will be in arrive at their destination in France they will tear down a building, build a septic tank, build shower rooms, dig out a basement... and enjoy Christian fellowship.

- 1 tablespoon crushed pineapple
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 crushed ice cubes
- Dash of cinnamon

Combine all ingredients and blend until smooth. Pour into a chilled glass.

Purple River

(one serving)

- 2 large scoops vanilla ice cream
- 1/4 cup very cold milk
- 1/4 to 1/2 cup grape juice, chilled
- 1/4 cup halved seedless green grapes
- 2 tablespoons toasted slivered almonds
- Whipped cream

Combine vanilla ice cream and milk; blend or beat until smooth. Add grape juice and blend completely. Stir in grapes and almonds. Pour into large chilled glass. Garnish with whipped cream and additional slivered almonds and a whole green grape if desired.

First Mates

(two servings)

- 3/4 cup very cold milk
- 4 large scoops vanilla ice cream
- 1/2 ripe banana, sliced
- 1 cup sliced fresh peaches
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 tablespoons undiluted frozen lemonade concentrate
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon malt powder

Combine all ingredients and blend or beat until smooth. Pour into chilled glasses.

Berry Buoy

(one serving)

- Lemon sherbet
- 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
- 1 drop yellow food coloring
- 1 cup milk
- Fresh strawberries or raspberries

In a mixing bowl place 1 large or 2 small scoops sherbet; beat in lemon rind and food coloring. Gradually blend in milk. Pour into chilled glasses; garnish with berries.
