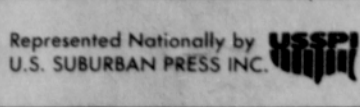

The Search for a Vice-President

Now that Jimmy Carter almost certainly will be the Democratic nominee for president, who's to be his running mate?

Carter alone knows and he's not saying, but right near the top of the list you can put Sen. Henry M. (Scoop) Jackson of Washington.

Pressure for Carter to name this candidate or that will mount between now and the election. Since he's from the South, political logic might dictate someone from California or one of the big Eastern states.

But Carter's preference, it's said, will be determined by the following:

1. Someone well-qualified for the presidency should something happen to the incumbent.
2. Someone politically compatible with Carter.
3. Someone who would add balance to the ticket, geographically and otherwise.

Of all the avowed candidates, Sen. Jackson comes nearest to Carter's views. They think alike on most things. Moreover, Sen. Jackson comes from an area where Carter did

poorly in the primaries and where Carter obviously needs help.

Sen. Jackson stands well with organized labor and with the party's liberal wing. Finally, Jackson has the ear of the military and of those who question detente with the Soviet Union.

Altogether, Sen. Jackson meets most of the criteria.

What about someone like Sen. Church or Gov. Brown of California? Brown, especially, might make sense politically but both Church and Brown are light years away from Carter on most matters. It's not likely either would do.

Carter has built his campaign largely on a non-Washington image and there have been suggestions that someone completely removed from politics—like Kingman Brewster Jr., president of Yale University—be named. However, these have been dropped as impractical.

With the smell of victory in the air, there will be no shortage of Democratic candidates for the No. 2 spot. Don't write off Scoop Jackson.

Future of Nuclear Power

A great deal of heat has been generated in the United States over the future of nuclear power.

Environmentalists and others have sought to curtail or even eliminate nuclear plants through ballot measure in a number of states. Their first such effort was roundly rebuffed by voters in California last week. Other attempts in other states, including Oregon, are scheduled later this year.

Whatever happens in future elections, no one should assume that nuclear power will be eliminated. A number of other countries—especially in the Communist bloc—have made it clear that they plan to press ahead with nuclear facilities.

Even if the U.S. unilaterally should scrap its facilities, no one else seems likely to follow suit. The need for power is just too great.

Sandy to prepare for possible civic center

Sandy City Manager Paul Helton has sent out a letter to Sandy civic leaders saying that it is going to be possible in the near future for Sandy to apply for an outright grant to build a civic center.

This grant would be made possible under a new Public Works Act which will be signed by President Ford.

Helton said it was the city's intention to apply for a block grant of some \$300,000. However, he added, that the city would need to be able to commence construction

within 90 days of that money becoming available.

To prepare for that, the city must finalize design and construction plans which would be ready to go 90 days after commitment of the funds.

Helton is asking for civic groups for ideas on design, facilities, furnishing, etc. Since these are the groups that will get the most usage from such a facility.

He has asked that groups select representatives to a committee by June 25 so the city can commence planning.

Memorial fund established

A Garlan McCulloch Memorial Fund has been established for the purpose of buying a defibrillator for the Sandy rural Fire Department.

McCulloch, a long-time Sandy resident senior vice-president of Clackamas County Bank, died suddenly of a heart attack last week. He was 59-years-old.

A defibrillator is a valuable life saving aid for heart attack victims which will

probably cost in excess of \$5,000.

Clackamas County Bank employees started the fund by making the first donation. The Sandy Chamber of Commerce has also contributed to the fund. Further donations may be made by contacting the Clackamas County Bank.

At this time, the Sandy firemen are trained up to the point of using a defibrillator and additional training will be needed if the defibrillator is acquired.

Post office dedication

Cancer Detection Clinic coming

The Mobile Cancer Detection Clinic will be parked at the Hoodland Park Building next Wednesday for women in the mountain area.

The clinic is operated by the American Cancer Society, Oregon Division, in connection with Emanuel Hospital.

The clinic will be staffed by professional people, who will do pelvic examinations, pap smears and do minimal breast examinations. Supporting services to the clinic will be performed by local volunteers.

Because of the number of women responding to the clinic's services, it is asked that

those women who have had a negative pap test in the last year, see their local or family physician.

Sponsors of the clinic further say that they hope that those women in the community who have not had a recent pap smear will avail themselves of this opportunity. There is no charge for this service.

Any woman wishing to have the test need only take an ordinary bath or shower in preparation.

Local volunteers will include Patti Griffin, 622-4653, and Nonie Smith, 622-3755. More information may also be obtained by calling the Hoodland Park Building at 622-3755.

The Hoodland Park Building is located on the Salmon River Road in Zig Zag.

The hours of the Wednesday clinic are from 9 a.m. - noon and from 1 - 4 p.m. No appointment will be necessary.

Tri-Met fare hike due July 1

Tri-Met's fares will go up five cents July 1. Regular fare will be 40 cents. The July monthly pass will cost \$14.

Grade school fares will increase to 20 cents and high school fares will increase to 30 cents.

Fares for "honored citizens" will remain at 10 cents during off-peak daytime hours, free in the evenings and on weekends and holidays. However, the fare for honored citizens riding during peak hours will be the full fare of 40 cents.

"This is the first fare increase in the 6½ years of Tri-Met's existence," King said.

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
