

Pediatric services subject of CHPA draft proposal

A draft proposal that discusses the future of pediatric services provided by hospitals in the six northwest Oregon counties (Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Multnomah, Tillamook and Washington) has been released for public comment by the Board of Directors of the Comprehensive Health Planning Association (CHPA).

CHPA, comprised of both health care consumers and providers, is the organization responsible for health care planning and development in this area.

Basically, the report urges that each hospital providing pediatric care reassess its role in providing pediatric services to the community using the report of the pediatric work group with the intention of maximizing quality of care and efficiency.

The report supports the view that the quantity and quality of health care provided to children (age 0-14) and adolescents (ages 15-19) need to be reassessed in light of tremendous advances made in

preventing such childhood diseases as measles, polio, whooping cough, rheumatic fever, etc. Accordingly, children are no longer hospitalized nearly as frequently as they have been in the past.

Reports are available for review in some libraries—call 297-2241 for information.

A series of public meetings will be held throughout north-west Oregon over the next month. At these meetings the draft of the report of the pediatric work group will be subject of discussion by all persons interested in child health care provided in the hospital setting.

A public meeting will be held June 29 from 5-6:30 p.m. in the Clackamas County Health Department Auditorium in Oregon City. Another meeting will be held July 19 from 5-6:30 p.m. in the Blue Cross Auditorium at 100 S.W. Market in Portland.

The CHPA Board of Directors will approve the report in final form at their October board meeting.

City Manager promotes convention center

A Sandy version of the Space Needle may not be just a pipe dream, according to City Manager Paul Helton.

If Sandy really wants an elevated restaurant and convention center to take advantage of a potential tourist industry, help may be found in other people's dollars.

Helton told members of the Sandy Chamber of Commerce Tuesday that certain agencies might consider giving the project financial help... if

Sandy could show that the plan would benefit the benefactors. Suggesting the attraction be done to fit into the city's natural wood and stone theme, Helton envisions an elevated restaurant, hotel-convention center, a monorail system to the mountain, and a heliport connecting the center, with the Portland Airport.

"A project like this would help reduce taxes, especially if we could get others to foot the bill for a portion of the attraction," Helton said. "I would like to see Sandy use its own money for the actual convention center-hotel complex," he added. "It would feed money right back to the city."

"Sandy is a sleeping giant," he said.

PSU offers free summer services

A learning materials center, which houses a collection of curriculum materials, is of particular interest to teachers and parents.

Educational kits, games, film strips and film loops are available for inspection. Weekly exhibits will feature educational media materials and equipment from various firms.

The center, located in 225 Lincoln Hall (1620 SW Park) is open 8 a.m. - 4 p.m., Monday through Thursday, June 22 - Aug. 13.

Kids in fields

Feds may cite berry farmers

Investigators for the U.S. Wage and Hour Division reportedly are looking for children under 12 working in East Multnomah and North Clackamas county berry fields in violation of federal statutes.

Don Henry, area director for the Division, refused to identify which East County farmers, if any, are involved.

Kaz Fujii, however, one of the largest local growers, said Wednesday that federal investigators appeared in his fields at dawn "like the Gestapo" and told him he had six minors under 12 employed there.

Henry noted that no fines were levied at all last year, although investigators found several violations.

"We don't want farmers to think since we didn't do anything about it last year, they're safe taking their chances this year. Some fines still could be assessed on last year's violations."

"We've just gotten started," he ex-

plained, "and no civil penalties have yet been assessed."

According to Henry, any farmer found to be in violation of the law would be advised of the law and of his violation. The law provides for a possible fine depending on all the facts. The number of under-age children employed, repetition of their employment and intent to violate the law are all considered.

If the federal government can prove willfulness on the part of the farmer, the case can be turned over to the solicitor's office for legal action.

The Wage and Hour Division won't release names, Henry said, because a fine imposed by that department is considered by Congress to be an administrative remedy. Violation is not a criminal matter unless willfulness is an issue.

Even if a farmer contests his fine, this hearing is held before an administrative law judge, rather than in a regular court.

Meeting planned

Pending the outcome of the "decision-only" hearing on July 19 by the Board of County Commissioners of the Firwood 5 acre amendment to the County Comprehensive Plan, Firwood's Neighbors, Inc., will tentatively follow a modified meeting schedule during July and August.

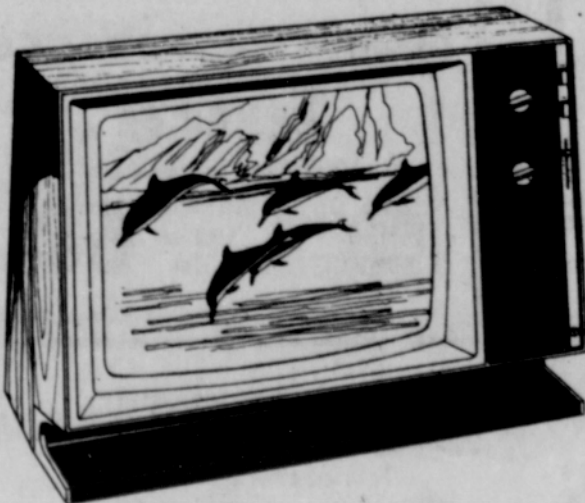

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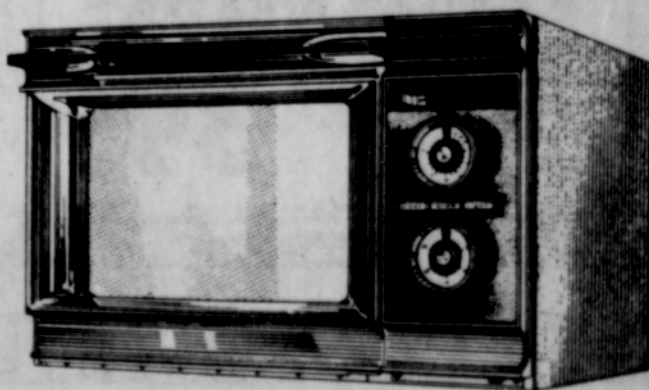
