Sign debate in council

said this would help encourage new business.

"If new business is going to come into Sandy, 32 square feet will not suffice," he said. He added that the city has more important things to look at—like the water problem.

The city council also approved two housekeeping measures. One made the recently approved city budget effective as of today and the other reallocated money to make last year's budget legal and not overexpanded in any area.

The council postponed a decision on an appeal of a design review board decision which approved the remodeling of Frederickson's Appliance. W.E. Davis came before the council saying that the remodeling of the store front has blocked some of the view of the Sandy Cinema

marquee next door to Frederickson's.

The city staff is presently looking into the legality of the design review board decision. The approval of the remodeling was made at the first meeting of the design review board.

In other business, the council approved a pole design for street lighting in subdivisions and the industrial park.

Approval was granted for a professional study team from the University of Oregon College of Health, Physical Education and Recreation to survey and assess the recreation-leisure program and facilities in the community. The study will cost the city \$900.

The council declared July 9 as Judge George Howeller day and in honor of this day named Howeller as the official judge of the pet rock race schedule as part of the festivities of the Sandy Mountain Festival.

Views make steep climb worthwhile

Mt. Hood reflected in the crystal clear waters of an Alpine lake make the steep climb up Burnt Lake Trail well worth the effort.

Native plant fans will enjoy the varied vegetation along the trail and lake, which includes heavy cedar cover, fir, rhododendron, huckleberry and a variety of wild flowers.

An extra climb to the ridge top gives breathtaking views of Burnt Lake, Mt. Hood and Mt. Adams.

From the ridge top, the hiker can travel Zigzag Mountain Trail to the top of Zigzag mountain, take trails to Devils Meadow, Cast Lake, Rhododendron or Paradise Park Trail.

Hikers should carry Mt. Hood Wilderness Area maps. Burnt Lake Trail can be reached from Lolo Pass Road. Complete directions are included on the Burnt Lake Trail No. 722 log, available at the Mt. Hood Forest Supervisor's Office.

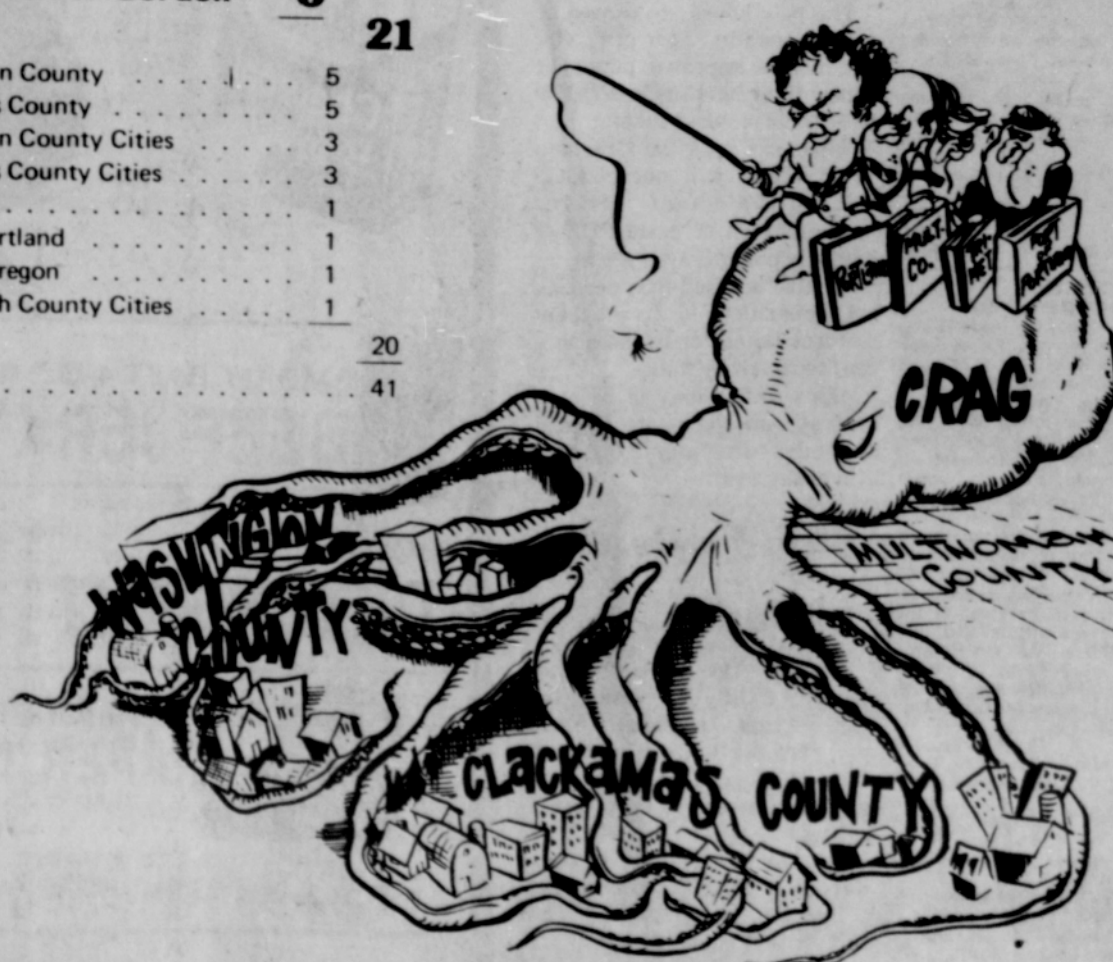
