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Welches school board proposes goals, principles

The Welches School Board is presently establishing educational principles and goals to guide the board and administration.

John Cook, superintendent principal for the district, says the board has asked for comments and input on the proposed list of principles. Feedback may be directed to one of the board members or to the school office at 622-3166. Welches School Board members are Bruce Erickson, Bill Dunham, Alan Jensen, Jim Turin, Alma Reick and Dick Quick.

Cook says input and suggestions will be used to revise and formally adopt the principles at a later board meeting.

The principles are said to be based upon "attitudes, beliefs and commitments of the board concerning the fundamental purposes and goals of public education."

The proposed principles state that the board believes that public education is essential to the perpetuation of democracy and that education activities should be shared jointly and in varying degrees by the school, home, church and community.

"These activities shall include the child's physical, social, emotional and spiritual growth of the individual," says the proposed statement.

The statement also says the board believes that the school should be operated in such a way that every child will have the opportunity to develop their maximum ability rather than bringing every child to the same achievement level.

The proposed principles indicate a belief that the kindergarten - fourth grade years are the most critical in forming healthy behavior and attitudes towards school and others.

Tri-Met fares go up July 1

Bus riders are reminded that Tri-Met fare is 40 cents as of Thursday, July 1.

Students can continue to use their student I.D. cards, but their fares will be 30 cents for high school and 20 cents for grade school pupils.

Fares for the elderly and handicapped who ride during off-peak hours will not change. Holders of Tri-Met Honored Citizen cards, issued to persons who are over 65 or certified as disabled, will continue to ride for 10 cents from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and free in the evening, on weekends and holidays. In peak hours they pay the full adult fare, now 40 cents.

Tri-Met notes that current pocket timetables which went into effect in mid-June, prior to the fare increase, still show the fare as 35 cents. That information will be updated when new schedules are issued in the fall.

Monthly passes now cost \$14 for unlimited rides during a calendar month. Savings may be greater still if the pass is used either by the purchaser or other family members for evening or weekend bus travel.
