Jehovah's Witnesses to attend Seattle conclave

Sandy area Jehovah's Witnesses will attend a four-day district convention in Seattle July 8-11. The convention will carry a theme of "sacred service."

For Jehovah's Witnesses that includes their international house-to-house visitation program, knocking on doors around the world.

The program at the Seattle Kingdom will go beyond this aspect of their religious life, however. It will stress what they call the great spiritual void in human society today and how this void can be filled.

Jehovah's Witnesses claim that more than half of all the Jehovah's Witnesses in the world have become such in the past five or six years. That adds up to 1,384,964 new adherents to the faith since 1970—more than 50 per cent of the international membership.

According to Floyd Hamblen, spokesman for the groups in Sandy, all this increase is attributed to individual interest in people.

The 30,000 Witnesses to be assembled in Seattle next week will hear speakers stress that society is seeking a solution to the problem of changing values. This includes moral, religious and social issues.

Hamblen says many charismatic and evangelical movements have developed as people seek greater meaning from religion. He said they desire more than traditional religious affiliation and are seeking some personal religious experience.

"There is a division in many religious systems in the world," Hamblen said. "Controversies rage over morals or moral issues such as divorce, birth control, homosexuality, pre-marital sex and women's liberation."

"As a result," he said, "the media continually expresses the viewpoints of clergymen, psychologists and scholars

Garden club completes historic tree book

Clackamas district gardeners were among 5,000 women in nearly 200 garden clubs at the annual convention of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs held last month at Jantzen Beach Thunderbird.

This climaxes another year of work on conservation, beautification and cooperation with government in making the environment more livable.

One project was marked at

the banquet when Thomas Vaughn, director of the Oregon Historical Society, received a compilation of "Oregon's Heritage: Historical Trees and Shrubs," for the Oregon Historical Society's library.

This is the work of Mrs. Milton Belsher and 17 women throughout the state who searched out and documented information on 350 trees and shrubs so that they may be

recognized and preserved.

A second set of books will go to Multnomah County Library and single regional volumes will be placed in libraries in the 27 areas in which they were compiled.

There was a display of historical subjects interpreted in flowers by the Capital Arrangers Guild, Salem.

Stitchery exhibit set for Clackamas fair

Stitchery as an art form, now enjoying a renaissance in popularity, will be one attraction at this year's Atrium Gallery art exhibition during the annual Clackamas County Fair. The fair will run Tuesday through Saturday, Aug. 17-21.

The new exhibit, made possible through the cooperation of the Columbia Stitchery Guild, will feature a variety of needlework techniques including beaded banner wall hangings and framed stitcheries.

Sue Roach, exhibit chairman for the guild, points out that stitchery is coming back as a decorative item in addition to its utilitarian functions.

"Our exhibit," she notes, "will portray the manner in which stitchery was used in American homes in by-gone years."

This year's art exhibit, in keeping with the Bicentennial salute theme of the fair, will also feature a "living room from the past."

A room setting, being designed and furnished by Black's Heritage House of Milwaukie, will dramatize antique furniture and accessories, nostalgic paintings and stained glass windows.

The Atrium Art Gallery, now in its 14th year at the fair, will again display the works of artists, both professional and non-professional, from all parts of the region. Last year was the

art exhibit's biggest year with over 700 paintings and numerous works of sculpture on display, says Marian Munger, art director for the fair.

Interest in the fair art exhibit has become so wide-spread, she says, that she's confident that participation in the 1976 Atrium Gallery will exceed last year's.

There are three classifications in the art exhibit, Mrs. Munger says. These are senior professional, senior non-professional and a junior division.

Paintings in both senior classifications will be designated modern and traditional. These will fall into two sections: (1) oil, acrylics or mixed media, and (2) water-colors, drawings, or prints.

Other media will include sculpture (wood, clay, metal) and stitchery (as an art form - no kits), hangings, stained glass, ceramics, found objects and assemblages. There will also be a classification covering other media in a potpourri of art forms. In this category, due to a great variety of entries, Mrs. Munger says six prizes will be awarded regardless of their "traditional" or "modern" qualities.

Senior professional premiums will be \$20 for first, \$15 for second, and \$5 for third. Entry fee will be \$2 for one to three entries in each class and medium. Each artist may enter up to nine entries.

Premiums in the senior non-professional division are \$15 for first, \$10 for second, and \$5 for third. Entry fee is \$1.50 for one to three entries in each class and medium, with each artist entitled to enter up to nine works.

The junior division is open to junior high and high school students and invites two types of entry: (1) oils, acrylics or other media, and (2) water-

colors or drawings. Entry fee is \$2 for two works, the limit set for junior artists. Premiums awarded will be \$10 for first, \$5 for second, and \$2.50 for third.

In addition to the regular premiums, several special awards will be presented in both senior divisions and in the junior division.

Prepaid shipped works will be received at the fair office after July 31. Mrs. Munger says. Works delivered in person will be received at the gallery on the upper level of the main pavilion Saturday, Aug. 14, from 10 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. and Sunday, Aug. 15, from 10 a.m. - 12 noon. The gallery will be closed Sunday afternoon and Monday, Aug. 16.
