Bicentennial events should be preserved

How did East Multnomah and Northeast Clackamas counties commemorate the country's 200th year?

What was its significance?

"These are the questions our children's children will ask," says the nation's Bicentennial Administrator, "and it is vital that the complete record of the Bicentennial be preserved in all its color, variety and scope."

John W. Warner, administrator of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA), expressed this opinion in discussing plans for insuring a permanent record of Bicentennial activities and achievements.

As a federal agency, the ARBA is working with the National Archives, the Smithsonian Institution and the Library of Congress to insure that the official record of the agency and artifacts of national significance are preserved.

Because the Bicentennial is essentially a grass roots commemoration, communities and organizations are being urged to preserve their own record of participation.

The ARBA recommends that community Bicentennial committees consult with state

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Outdoor Tips and Tales

Fish limit like icing on cake

The owner of this boat is a conservationist: he seldom catches a limit. It isn't planned that way. That's just how it happens'... Sign in a boat.

ANOTHER thing sure about that fisherman is that he's able to laugh at himself. He's lucky, because it's obvious that he hasn't made the ultimate measure of his fishing trip whether or not he has caught a limit. When a limit becomes necessary for the success of fishing, it seems to me its lost a lot of its fun.

Of course an attitude such as this can be used as an excuse for being a bum fisherman. And it's also true that the more we know about fishing, the more fun it becomes. And after all, getting something on the end of your line is the main reason for fishing.

Still, the man or woman who can be happy with a slow day is doubly blessed when the limit day comes along. The limit is like icing on the cake.

A COMMON sight on any large body of water is at least one boat laboring along, its motor working hard while the boat refuses to make the speed it should for its horsepower.

This used to be only inconvenient. Today, it can be downright costly. A laboring motor can eat up twice as much of today's expensive fuel as it

should.

Sometimes a few little things can correct the problem. Boat racers are sticklers for little things, and following are some tips from the Johnson Outboards racing team:

For one thing, be sure your motor is putting out like it should. You can sometimes tell just by listening. But a good tachometer will tell if you're getting the right RPM's.

If this is a problem, check the propellers. A dealer can help match your prop to your boat, including the loads you carry and whether you're interested more in speed, cruising, or slower running with a lot of trolling.

Balance is a word that has been kicked around for years but often ignored. Shifting a few things around (including people) can mean your boat will require less horsepower to keep the bow out of the water. Then the rest of your horsepower can be used to push your hull faster—which means more distance per gallon.

Racers also make sure their boats are perfectly straight on the rear planing surfaces. This can take some tedious fiberglass work and block sanding to eliminate what are called hooks and rockers.

In some cases eliminating these irregularities has upped speed as much as five miles per hour. Which also saves fuel.

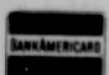

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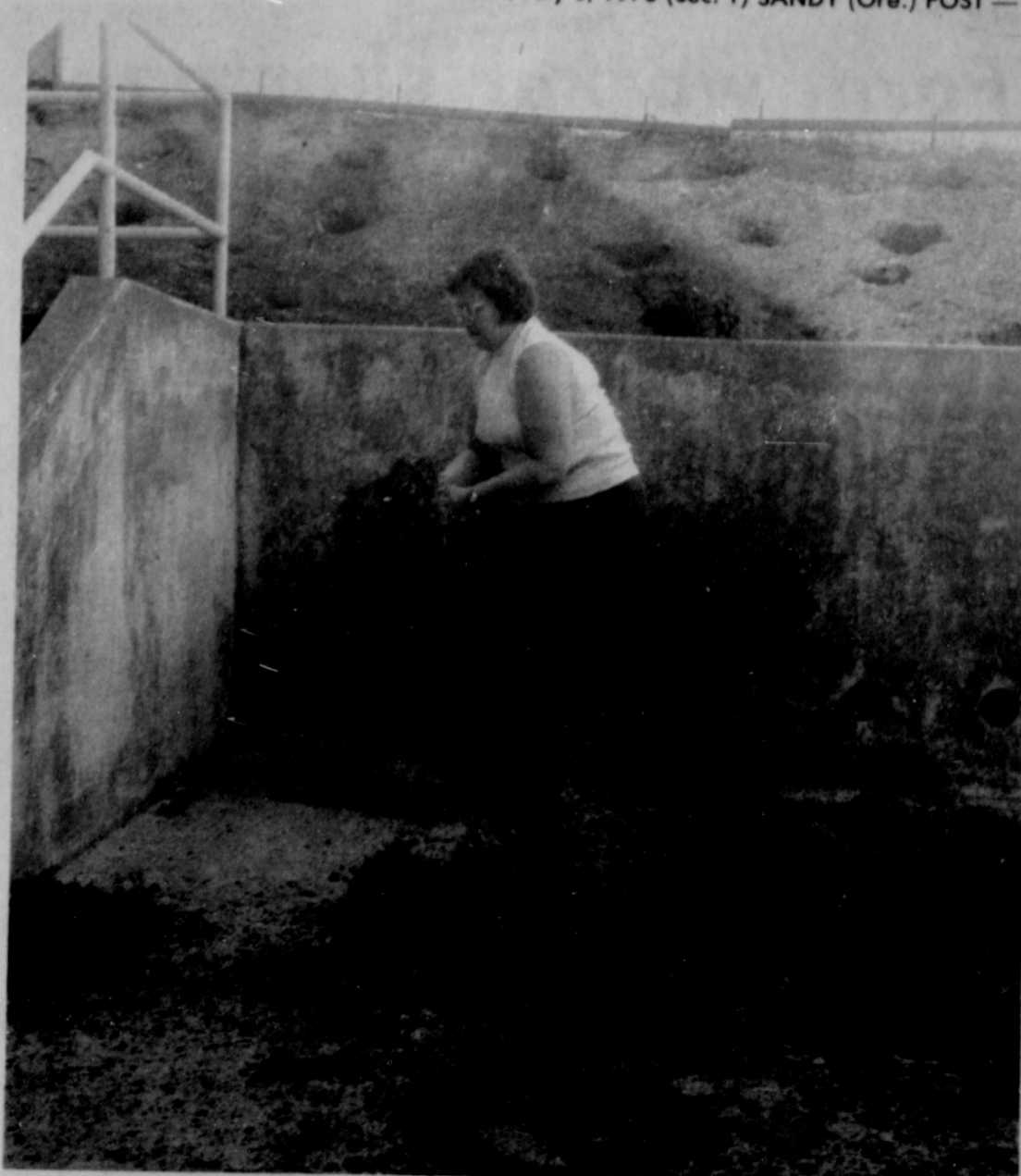


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Vandals strike
