

Homestead camp primmed, trimmed for Girl Scouts

A lot has been done on the Homestead. The Girl Scout camp near Rhododendron has been primmed and trimmed and remodeled by the Columbia River Girl Scout Council to ready for the onslaught of summer day campers, which will begin July 12.

Girl Scout troops that use the facility in the winter will like the new look, also.

Stevenson Lodge, named after former caretaker Hugh Stevenson, boasts inside remodeling and a brand new deck. Up-to-date kitchen facilities have been added.

Two clubs of the Pacific Northwest Four-Wheel Drive Association have cleared debris, split and stacked wood and helped with chores.

Different troops from the Columbia River Girl Scout Council use the facility. Pat Aeppli, site manager, recently showed off the Homestead during an open house.

Local Girl Scouts conducted tours of the 32 acre camp. Trails, like the popular Hunchback route, wind through the forest. A chapel under tall firs offers a place for meditation.

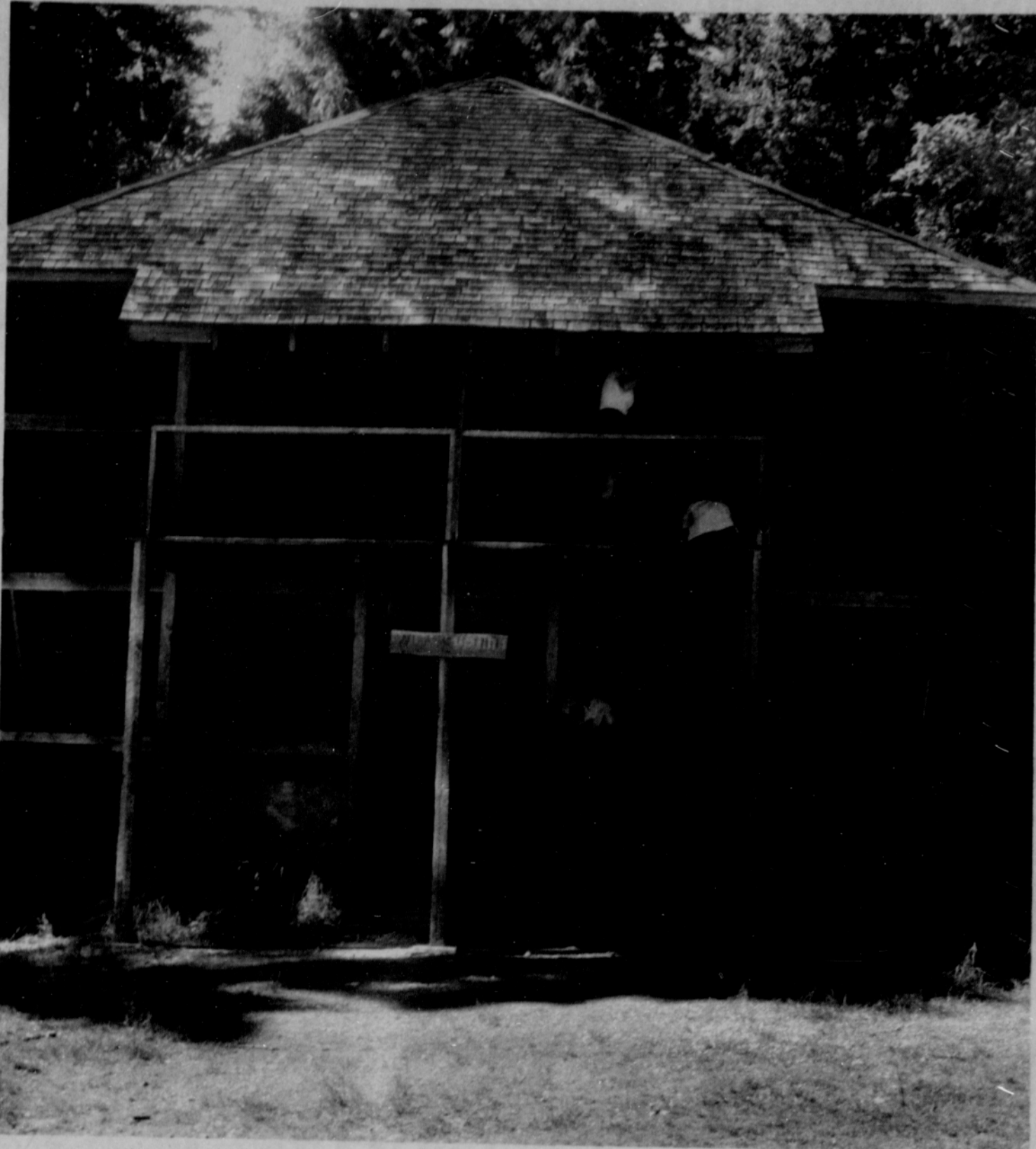
Across from Stevenson Lodge is the "We-Ask-U-Inn," an old barn used for play and over-night ventures.

"I've cut a lot of wood out here," he laughed. Ed and Modean Weaver are the resident caretakers now.

MHCC pay talks reach impasse

Factfinding has begun at Mt. Hood Community College as negotiations between the district and faculty association have stalled.

The college faculty representatives say they want a more equitable share of the district's budget. Representatives have also said they believe the college administration has placed too much emphasis on expansion.

Instructors contracts at the college lapsed July 1.

Garry Bullard, attorney and negotiator for the MHCC board, said "Economic issues and the role of the faculty association in the governance of the college are unresolved."

Negotiations came to an end last week when a mediation session June 28 failed to result in an agreement.

Bullard said he believes "the salary offer presented to the faculty association which

represents about 150 full-time instructors, was equitable and comparable to other state community college settlements."

The college board began negotiations with the faculty association in January 1976. A mediator was assigned by the state to assist in bringing the parties to a settlement when an impasse was declared by the faculty association May 26.

During the mediation many issues were resolved with the exception of money.

Factfinding is a process which identifies major issues in a particular labor dispute by one or more impartial individuals who review the positions of both parties, resolve factual differences and make recommendations for settlement of the dispute.

The college lost its third attempt at additional funding for this year June 29.

Boundary group to meet

The Portland Metropolitan Area Local Government Boundary Commission will meet at 7 p.m. July 28 to consider the annexation to Sandy of some territory located on the south edge of the city.

The territory is bounded generally on the south by the

east-west extension of Dubarko Road and on the east by Meinig Road. On the north the property is bounded by a line parallel to and approximately 500 feet south of Bornstedt Road and on the west by State Highway 211.

The meeting will be held in room 602 of the Multnomah County Courthouse.
