Ironing fact sheet

Seams, darts and ease of home-sewn garments look more professionally finished if they are pressed over a rounded pressing pad rather than a flat ironing board, says Ardis Koester, Oregon State University extension textiles and clothing specialists.

In addition, fabrics of wool and thermoplastic man-made fibers retain their shape better.

Although pressing pads may be purchased, they can be made at home if time is available, the specialist points out in "Making Pressing

Pads," a new OSU Extension Service fact sheet.

The publication gives directions for making pressing mits, hams and shoulder shape pads. The pressing pads may be compactly filled with either fine sawdust or finely snipped wool scraps. They may be covered with muslin, wool or a combination.

Copies of the fact sheet are available from Multnomah or Clackamas county offices or from the OSU Bulletin Clerk in Corvallis.

What's cooking

Sweet, sour meat balls, baked meringues

Sweet and Sour Meat Balls

1 pound ground beef
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 teaspoon salt
Dash pepper
2 tablespoons shortening
1 medium green pepper, cut into strips

1 medium onion, sliced
1 1/2 cups pineapple juice
1/4 cup Heinz 57 sauce
Hot buttered rice

Lightly combine first four ingredients; form into 16 meatballs. Partially brown meat balls in shortening. Add green pepper and onion, saute until vegetables are tender.

Stir in pineapple juice and 57 sauce. Cover; simmer 15-20 minutes or until meatballs are cooked. Thicken sauce with cornstarch-water mixture.

Raw Vegetable Medley

1 pound carrots, slice thin, cook crispy, 5-6 minutes. Drain. 2 heads cauliflower, break in bite sizes. Cook 1 minute. Drain.

4 cups celery. Cut in small pieces. Cook 5 minutes. Drain. 1 large size onion, thinly sliced

1 large green pepper, thinly sliced
Dressing:

1 package Good Season's Italian Salad dressing
Two-third cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 cup salad oil
3/4 cup vinegar
1 teaspoon dry mustard

Mix and pour over vegetables. Cover and put into refrigerator and allow flavors to blend for at least several hours. Keeps in refrigerator for days.

Macaroni Salad

3 cups macaroni (uncooked)
9 hard-boiled eggs, chopped
4 large sweet pickles, chopped
1 1/2 green onions and tops, chopped

1 cup sharp cheddar cheese, cubed
Salt and pepper to taste
Cook macaroni 10 minutes in salted water. Drain, and cool.

1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup coconut
4 eggs
Mix ingredients with enough Best Foods mayonnaise to make a moist salad.

The canning season is here and beets will soon be ready in the gardens. Here is a good way to preserve your beets.

Beet Relish
1 qt. cooked beets, peeled and chopped
1 qt. raw chopped cabbage
1 cup ground horseradish
1 pint sugar
1 tablespoon salt

For several months I've been hearing about Impossible Pie and how good it is. I finally got the recipe.

Impossible Pie
2 cups milk

Makes 12 large or 15 medium meringues. To serve, fill the hollow with ice cream topped with sweetened fresh or canned fruit.—from the files of Mrs. Charles Frasier, (Carolyn), Sandy.

Baked Meringues
7 egg whites
1 tablespoon vinegar
2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
Beat egg whites until stiff. Add sugar slowly beating constantly. Add vanilla and vinegar slowly and beat until very stiff and glossy. Grease baking sheets and cover with wax paper.

Place by spoonful on baking sheet. With the back of a spoon make a hollow in the center of each.

Bake at 275 degrees for at least an hour. Do not peek. Remove from wax paper while warm, being careful not to break them.
