He'd work in the bakery in the daytime and as a drummer at the Hoyt Hotel evenings so the family could save enough money for school in Switzerland.

Wife Lana, and sons Dennis, now 14, and Marcus, 11, didn't see much of him.

"My wife is a saint," Jack said. "This business has been quite a strain on the family."

Things are leveling out a bit and the shop will mark its fourth year in August, but Jack still gets up at 4 a.m.

"Sometimes I get up at 2 a.m. on Saturdays when we have lots of wedding cakes," he said. "If I didn't enjoy what I did, I'd be crazy to work this hard."

The hard work will be

recognized when the shop is honored as National Retailer of the Month. Heidi's Swiss Pastries will be featured as the cover story in the August issue of "Bakery Marketing and Production," a trade magazine.

There are fashions in bakery products as there are in clothes, Jack said.

"People now want lots of color in their wedding cakes. White cakes with lemon filling used to be the rule, but now a couple might have a Swiss chocolate layer, a carrot layer, a date nut layer and a banana layer."

The chef studied architecture at Benson High School.

"It's really helped me," he

said, pointing out a six-foot wedding cake in the store salesroom. "The art classes were good, too."

He and his cake decorators are aided in their efforts to transcribe a customer's picture onto the cake by an opaque projector.

Roses magically materialize and the rocks in the fisherman's pond are edible.

"People ask me if I worry. If you had 18 wedding cakes to make, you'd worry, too," Jack joked. He glanced at an order that include fillings, trimmings and cake flavors.

While much of his time is spent with cakes, Jack's heart belongs to fancy pastries.

He admits to sneaking into

the shop on Sunday afternoons to create a special pastry or torte just for the joy of it.

"My love is the pastries," There are fruity ones, nutty ones, chocolatey ones.

Most popular item is the chocolate eclair. They make about 120 a day—fill them with custard and top with chocolate fondant.

There are few leftovers. "They sell because we make them right—the chocolate topping is the key," Jack, ever the chocolate-aholic, said.

Jack has one regret. He doesn't have time to make the chocolate candies himself.

"Maybe someday," he said wistfully as he turned to a tiered wedding cake.

Helton's concept muddled by Space Needle picture

Some confusion has recently been voiced over what Sandy City Manager Paul Helton was proposing last month when he unveiled his picture of the Seattle Space Needle pasted against the background of Mt. Hood.

Helton says the image of the Seattle Space Needle was strictly an object image. It was placed upon the water color to give an idea of what could be done.

He says his suggestion would call for a design which would be more in line with the esthetic surroundings of the community and it could be centered around the logging industry common to

the area. Helton has mentioned that something modeled after a forest service tower might be appropriate.

And Helton's suggestion is for a tower 125-150 feet high, in comparison to the 600-foot-high Seattle landmark.

"Because of our altitude here, the tower would not have to be as high to provide a view of the Sandy River Valley and Mt. Hood," he said.

Helton added that he would like to see something which would be unique to the area and would provide a view of the Sandy River Valley and Mt. Hood.

Suggesting the attraction be

done to fit into the city's natural wood and stone theme, Helton envisions an elevated restaurant, hotel-convention center, a monorail system to the mountain, and a heliport connecting the center with the Portland Airport.

"A project like this would help reduce taxes, especially if we could get others to foot the bill for a portion of the attraction," Helton told the Sandy Chamber of Commerce in June.

"I would like to see Sandy use its own money for the actual convention center-hotel complex," he added. "It would feed money right back to the city."

Helton told the Post that he thought it was unfortunate that the imagery of the Seattle Space Needle had to be used to make people sit up and take notice of the concept.

"But the only thing we had to go by was something already in existence."

Vet loans increase

Oregon veterans' farm and home loans went to 18,536 veterans in 1975-76 in the amount of \$468,380,939 for the highest fiscal year on record, says Department of Veterans' Affairs Director, H.C. Saalfeld.

This was a 23 per cent increase in loans and a 38 per cent gain in dollar volume over the previous record year, 1974-75, when 15,045 veterans borrowed \$339,248,981.

Saalfeld says last year's volume represents 73 loans for \$1.8 million every working day. The monthly average was 1,544 loans for \$39 million.

In Clackamas County last year, loans were granted to 2,224 veterans in the amount of \$9,609,134 compared with 1,755 loans in 1974-75 for \$41,935,969.

Since the loan program started in 1945, loans have gone to 15,848 veterans in this county in the amount of 280,414,446. Statewide, 146,678 loans have been granted for \$2,306,796,346.

The loan program is self supporting and during its 31 years of operation, Saalfeld says it has earned a net profit of \$39.6 million.

Holbrook in training

Cadet Lewis G. Holbrook, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce M. Holbrook, 17409 SE Sunnyside Rd., Boring, is receiving practical work in military leadership at the Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps advanced camp at Ft. Lewis, Wash.

The six-week ROTC advanced camp provides an opportunity for cadets to develop and demonstrate leadership capabilities in a field training environment.

Most cadets are fulfilling their advanced camp requirements during the summer between their junior and senior years in college. However, there will be a number of graduating seniors who will receive Army commissions at the completion of camp.

Cadet Holbrook, a student at Oregon State University in Corvallis, is one of more than 48,000 cadets from colleges and universities across the nation, enrolled in Army ROTC training.

The 20-year-old cadet is a 1973 graduate of Clackamas High School.
