Bob Butler captured the prize for maple bar and coffee eat off, and Margaret Waber and Kelly Quint tied for honors in the pan-handling test.

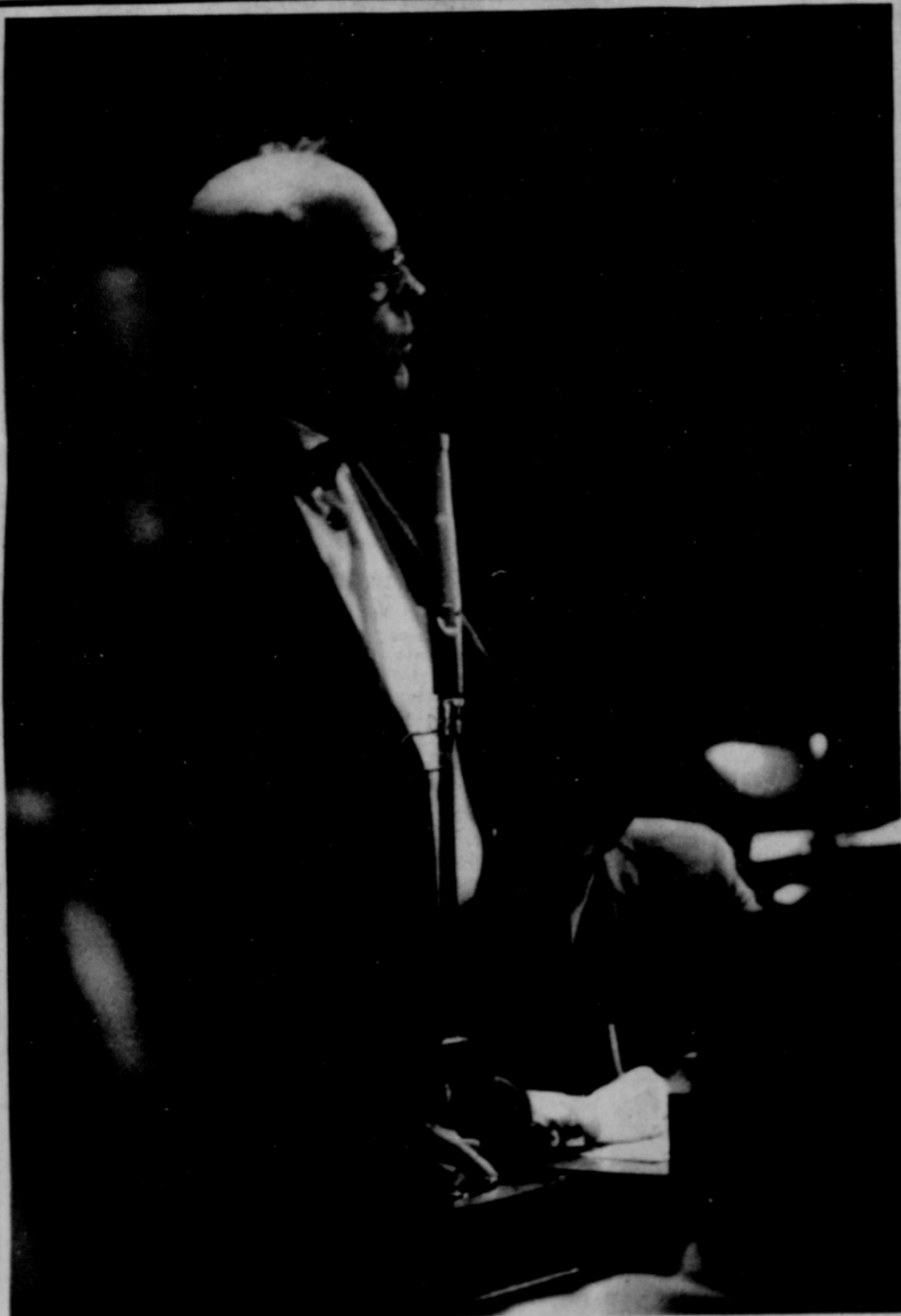

* Specifically, the amount of money Paul Walden helped return to Oregon taxpayers in one bill during the last legislative session was \$42.8 million. This included raising the personal exemption from \$675 to \$750 — amounting to a saving of \$24 million in this area alone — a provision for deduction of Day Care expenses for working mothers; provision for changing the tax on individual retirement accounts; the decision not to apply a state income tax on the federal tax rebate; and establishment of a rental assistance program for the low income elderly. It all added up to \$42.8 million in a measure that Paul Walden not only voted for, but helped support in committee and fought for on the floor of the house.
