Commission to review applications

The Clackamas County Planning Commission will review applications for conditional use permits in their next meeting at the Clackamas County Courthouse.

In one application, Merle and Jessie Castle would like to use a mobile home as a family residence in an area currently zoned for Transitional Timber.

The location of their proposed residence is on the east side of Cockerleas Road, south of the Thomas Road intersection.

In another permit application, Bryce Nedry has asked to place a mobile home near Boring in a Farm Forest zoned area for use as a single family residence.

These and other permit applications will be reviewed at 7 p.m. April 25 in the County Courthouse Building at Oregon City.

Lund informs seniors of growth

Sandy Elementary Supt. Clark Lund showed slides of the district's school buildings which house 1,400 students at last Thursday's Golden Age Club meeting.

Because of the great influx of the housing development in the Sandy area, it is a challenge, Lund stated, to determine the best solution to acquiring the additional class rooms which will be needed to take care of the increase in enrollment expected in the next five years.

It is not a crisis yet, but could become one, Lund said.

Lund shared statistical information which was the result of a survey conducted by a

team from the University of Oregon, who evaluated the overall picture of Sandy Elementary school last fall.

A band composed of sixth grade girls and boys from the Cottrell Grade School gave a short band concert. Their director was Dave Anderson.

Maude Johnson, president, presided at a short business meeting. Margaret Silvers substituted for Martha Steffl as secretary.

The nominating committee was announced as Leah Bodley, Pauline Allen and Harold Burns for the election of officers in May.

Prognosis for tax rebate said dim by Jernstedt

Despite his best efforts, State Sen. Ken Jernstedt reports that the future of his tax rebate bill "looks dim."

The bill which Jernstedt sponsored, would return two thirds of all state taxes which the state over-collected up to a maximum of \$300.

But, says Jernstedt, "Now there is a problem. That \$170 million surplus, which should be returned, is being spent."

Jernstedt added that much of the money is being funnelled into the pet projects of those in charge of the decision making process.

"It appears," he said, "that there will be plenty of special interest projects ready and willing to spend our money."

Jernstedt also said that he had spoken with Sen. Mark Hatfield about the drought.

The main topic was Governor Bob Straub's request to declare 21 Oregon counties disaster areas. This would pave the way for low cost loans to help those who have lost crops or livestock due to the drought.

Jernstedt said that "the full

impact of the drought has not been realized, both in Oregon and in Washington, D.C."

Jernstedt added that his role in the conversation with Hatfield was to discuss the federal government's role in drought relief.

Jernstedt declined to speculate as to a closing date for the current session. Although bill production has been feverish, only a few major bills have come out of committee for full floor debate.

There is a rumor that House Speaker Lang is preparing a last day motion for June 1, but Jernstedt said that his "own crystal ball is too clouded to make a prediction."

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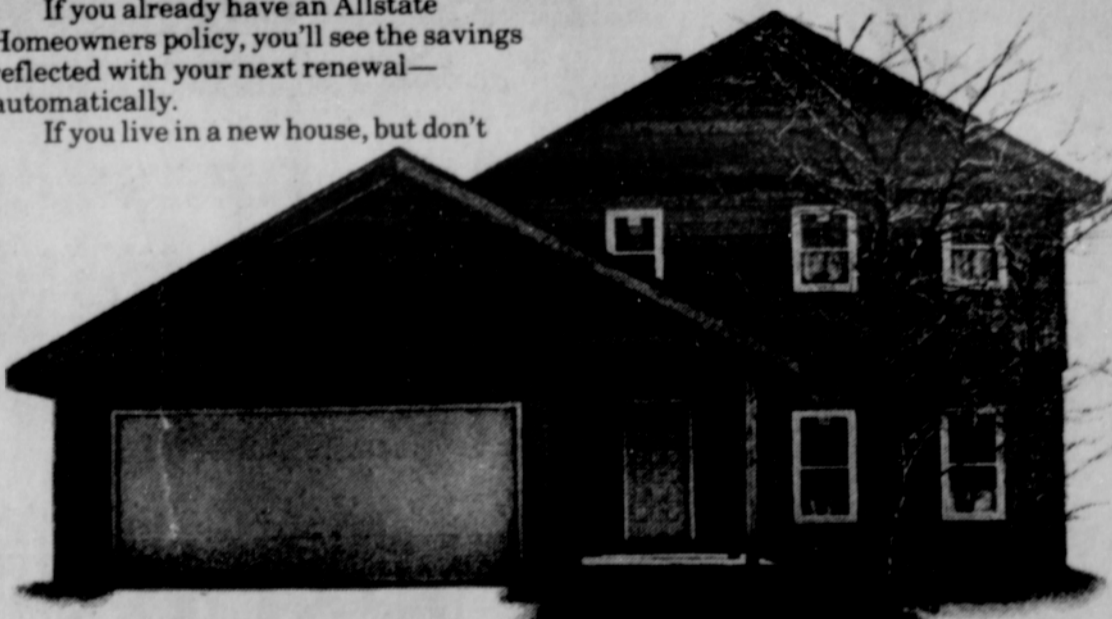
