It's fun to read what went on in 1947 and 1948. He seems to have kept it daily for both

years. Also found one of my mother's diaries but she was more interested in family goings on, mostly of all the times we seemed to move—which was often every year.

Wonder if moving could be a hereditary thing, as my son and daughter-in-law seem to move almost as often.

However, all our family moves ended up some time during the year at the mountain, for a year or more stay. We were always here in the summer. Can't think of one we missed before we ended up here permanently. Never a dull moment.

Game season topic of hearing

Big game hunting will be the topic at an April 30 hearing when the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission reviews conditions of the state's big game population and makes recommendations for the 1977 hunting season.

The meeting will be at the Bonneville Power Administration Auditorium, 1002 NE Holladay in Portland beginning at 9 a.m.

The commission will be faced with the task of formulating regulations which strike some kind of balance between what is desired by the hunting population and what is possible when biological and social considerations are taken into account.

Factors considered include animal population trends, herd age and sex composition, winter range condition, conflicts with agriculture and the desires of hunters as expressed in writing or at public meetings.

In addition to the Portland meeting there will be seven town hall forums held

statewide to monitor public opinion.

Among the possible management steps being considered by the Wildlife Department are:

—Restriction of hunters to use of a single weapon of their choice (rifle, muzzle loading rifle or bow and arrow) for deer and elk hunting.

—Restricting hunters to hunting bucks or does, but not both in any one season.

—Restricting mule deer and black tail deer tag holders to controlled hunts of their respective tags only.

—Control elk hunting through refuges, branch antler rules, a tag sale cut-off date and multiple seasons with hunters restricted to one choice.

The commission seeks written input as well as verbal. Interested persons are invited to write the Department of Fish and Wildlife, Wildlife Division, P.O. Box 3503, Portland, Oregon 97208.

The final hearing on hunting regulations will be May 21 in Portland.
