Festival organizers work toward July event

Organizers of the Sandy Mountain Festival are looking for community support to make this year's festival a reality.

The third annual arts and crafts event is slated for July 9-10 at Sandy's Meinig Park.

The festival is a non-profit community event financed entirely by contributions and fees paid by participating artists.

Although a relative newcomer among the many arts and crafts festivals held each year, the Sandy Mountain Festival has grown to be one of the largest and best attended festivals in the Pacific Northwest.

Last year's attendance was at an estimated 35,000 people.

Lynn Ellis, one of the organizers of the festival, said she already has had commitments from a variety of local artists to participate in the event.

Dan Stevens, a potter from Boring who teaches at Gresham High School, will display his works at what festival organizers have nicknamed Steven's Stump.

Joan Miller from Sandy will

be displaying her pen and ink drawings underneath what's known during the festival time as the Miller tree.

Robert Brown from Estacada will be displaying paintings in Brown's Corner.

Ellis said leather etchings by Rosemary Jones from Mt. Hood will be displayed in a spot nicknamed the Rose Garden. Sandy artist Martha Decker is also due to participate.

Mrs. Ellis said organizers began working on the plans for this year's festival immediately after the closure of last year's event.

"Now as we draw closer to the festival we are involving more and more people, she told The Post.

Artists from Portland are also due at the festival.

"Fantastic artists have been coming from Portland," Mrs. Ellis said. "Many have been with the Rose Festival for years."

Along with the arts and crafts displays, entertainment and food are also on the program.

Groups such as Cock and Bull, the Reflections and Sure Fire will provide everything

from folk and western music to bluegrass.

Sandy Union High School drama teacher Margaret Traxel will coach local high school students in melodrama and children's theatre productions during the weekend.

In conjunction with the Sandy Mountain Festival, local residents and business people will again organize activities centering around what's known as the Sandy Mountain Festival Days.

A second annual pet rock race, a beer garden, horseshoe tournament and street dance are some of the activities tentatively planned.

Mrs. Ellis said financing for those activities is separate from the Sandy Mountain Festival.

Those contributing to the festival are categorized as either donors, patrons or sponsors, depending on the amount of financing given.

Barbecued pork chops, marinated string beans

Barbecued Pork Chops
2 pounds pork chops
3/4 cup catsup
3 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
1 1/2 cups water
1 onion sliced
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper, freshly ground
1 teaspoon celery seed
Cook meat 30 minutes at 450 degrees. Combine remaining ingredients in saucepan; bring to a boil. Pour sauce over meat.

1 cucumber
1 sweet onion, sliced
1 cup tarragon vinegar
1 cup Wesson oil
Mushrooms
Salt and pepper to taste
Mix and leave in refrigerator overnight. A real Southern recipe. Delicious served cold and very good with barbecued meats. This is always a favorite.

1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
Sift and add:
4 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
Add and stir:
1/2 pound candied cherries
1/2 pound candied pineapple
1 1/4 cups chopped nuts
Shape into roll about 3 inches in diameter. Chill overnight. Slice them and place on greased sheet.

Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Serves 4.
